ALL RED LINE TRANSCONTINENTAL

BRITISH POST OFFICE EMPLOYES REFUSED

London, Nov. 19—The demand of 100,000 employes of the British Post Office for higher pay was rejected today by Herbert Samuel, the postmaster-general. He sweetened his refusal by making some concessions in regard to the conditions of labor, but he said that their demand for an increase of 15 per cent on their wages meant \$12,500,000 more a year, and would necessitate the imposition of new taxation.

Mr. Samuel, referring to the threats of the men to strike in case their demands were not conceded, intimated that those who quit work would be regarded as having resigned their positions.

The deputation, clearly dissatisfied, said they would have to refer the decision to the men's union.
