CENTRAL BUREAU FOR TOURISTS

Montreal, Oct. 27.—The Automobile Club of Canada has taken preliminary steps toward the establishment of a central bureau for the convenience of automobile tourists and for the promotion of a larger volume of that class of traffic to Montreal and the Province of Quebec generally. The project was outlined at a meeting of representative merchants, hotel, railway and steamship men, and met with unanimous approval. It was pointed out by the chairman, J. R. Douglas, president of the Automobile Club of Canada, that much of the work of such a bureau had been done and was being done, but that the task had outgrown the club. The information to be supplied would cover routes, hotels, points of interest, historical and otherwise, hunting, and fishing facilities and other items which would simplify matters for tourists and encourage them in coming to Montreal and other parts of the province. Another object of the bureau would be to agitate for good roads.

MAINE ILLITERACY REDUCED.
Augusta, Maine, Oct. 27.—Federal statistics for 1910 gave Maine 2,907 illiterates between the ages of 10 and 20. The

special census taken this year reduced the number to 541. It is thought the excellent showing is, in large measure, due to the compulsory education laws. The last legislature, under the Child Labor Act, strengthened this law in that it requires the completion of the sixth grade of the common schools according to the State of Maine plan, and lifts the age from 14 to 15.

GENERAL VS. VICAR.
London, Eng., Oct. 27.—At a reception returned soldiers at Langley Mill, General Seely, the undersecretary for air, accepted a challenge by the vicar, the Rev. H. G. Grist, to a singing duel, with the audience as judges. The vicar sang the "Anchor's Weighed" and the general followed with "John Peel," accompanying himself at the piano. The verdict of a draw was announced amid applause and each singer received a box of chocolates.

A general lockout of workmen throughout Spain, effective November 4, has been declared by the Congress of Spanish Employers.

Six Sinn Féiners, including Commons Shack and Beasley, political prisoners at Manchester, made their escape last week.

According to Dr. J. H. Jewett, who sailed on Saturday from New York for England, Scotland will go dry next year. He said he did not believe it is realized on this side how far the temperance movement has progressed in the British Isles.

QUESTION OF WOMEN
AS Y. M. C. A. WORKERS
New York, Oct. 27.—Shall women retain a prominent place in the Young Men's Association to serve its social and social workers in the home buildings as they served in the hotels in France? That is one of the questions to be decided at the fortieth international convention of the Association of North America to be held at Detroit, Novem-

ber 19 to 23. A special commission on the conservation of war values is to report on the matter. This group, of which Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick is a member, is considering following London's successful example in using men and women "Y" workers on the streets to give information and invite lone and tempted young men to a wholesome good time. The use of the army "Y" but in industrial centres is also to be discussed.

Eight other commissions and committees are to report on various subjects and Dr. John R. Mott, general secretary of the association, believes that this will be the most important convention yet held.

William Jessop, foreign secretary of the Y. M. C. A., delivered an interesting address on the recent campaign in Egypt and Palestine in the Central Baptist church yesterday morning and in Centenary Methodist church in the evening.
