Depuis plusieurs années, Mr Peter S. Murphy a bien voulu ajouter à ses prix de fondation huit médailles d'argent, qui sont offertes aux élèves du Cours Primaire, pour récompenser le bon Langage français et la Politesse.

Prix COMTE

Monsieur Benjamin Comte a fondé un prix perpétuel de 30 piastres, en faveur de l'élève du cours commercial qui s'est le plus distingué par sa bonne conduite, son application constante et ses succès pendant l'année. Ce prix a été régulièrement accordé, selon les intentions du donateur, depuis l'année 1873. Chaque année, sa vie durant, Mr Benjamin Comte a ajouté 20 piastres à la valeur provenant de la fondation, ce qui a permis de porter le prix à 50 piastres; son neveu et digne héritier, Mr Joseph Comte, a continué cette généreuse tradition, de sorte que, jusqu'à ce jour, le prix Comte a été de 50 piastres.

Autres Prix

Aux généreux donateurs dont les noms viennent d'être mentionnés, l'Académie a l'honneur d'ajouter les suivants:

Le prix du Gouverneur-Général du Canada, fondé en 1880 par le Marquis de Lorne et continué par le Marquis de Lansdowne, consistant en une médaille d'argent décernée au meilleur élève de la classe de Littérature;

Le prix du Surintendant de l'Instruction publique, fondé en 1880 par l'Hon. Gédéon Oulmet, une croix d'or offerte au meilleur élève de la sixième année;

Les prix du Séminaire du Saint-Sulpice, une cinquantaine de riches volumes, offerts depuis 1800, pour récompenser les élèves qui se distinguent davantage dans le cours d'instruction religieuse.

Since a few years, Mr P. S. Murphy has kindly given, besides his endowment prizes, eight Silver Medals, to be distributed to the pupils of the Primary Course who have distinguished themselves by their correct pronunciation of the French language and their politeness.

The COMTE Prize

Mr Benjamin Comte, founded a Prize of \$30. It is awarded to the Pupil of the Commercial Course who most distinguishes himself by his good conduct, application to study and success. Since 1873, this prize has been regularly awarded in accordance with the intentions of the Donor. During his lifetime, Mr Benjamin Comte gave an additional sum of 20 dollars to be added to the interest of the endowment, this increased the prize to 50 dollars; his worthy heir and nephew, Mr Joseph Comte, has continued this generous donation; so that, up to the present time, the Comte prize has been \$50.

Other Prizes

With the generous benefactors just mentioned, the Academy is loud to mention the following:

The Governor General of Canada. His Excellency the Marquis of Lorne presented a Silver Medal during each year of his term of office. His Excellency the Marquis of Lansdowne has, since coming to Canada, also presented a Silver Medal. It is awarded to the pupil of the Literature Class, who stands first in the class;

The Superintendent of Education. In 1880, the Hon. Gédéon Oulmet, Superintendent of Education, presented a Gold Cross. It is awarded annually to the best pupil of the Sixth year;

The Seminary of Saint-Sulpice Since 1800, the Seminary of Saint-Sulpice has annually offered some fifty valuable volumes, which are awarded to the pupils who distinguish themselves in the Course of Religious Instruction.

CONDITIONS

To compete for the Extra Prizes, the pupils must have preserved at least the following percentage on all the notes of the year, viz:

Primary Course.....75 per cent
Intermediate Course.....80 per cent
Commercial Course.....90 per cent
