LONDON, April 1.—The rate of discount of the Bank of England was reduced today from 3 to 2½ per cent. This is the first change since January 14, when the rate was advanced from 2½ to 3 mainly for the purpose of building up the bank's gold reserve. The steady influx of gold from all quarters, especially from America, decided the directors of the Bank of England to reduce the rate to 2½ per cent at today's meeting. In confident anticipation of today's announcement exchangkes on London declined as a consequence and Vienna was enabled to purchase \$2,500,000 gold on the market.
