Water in Toronto harbor has never before been so low as it is at present.

From Winnipeg comes a report that Hugh John McDonald denies that he will be entering politics.

Messrs. Rhodes, Curry & Co. of Amherst, are to build new stations on the I. C. R. at Windsor Junction and at Dartmouth.

A. Belleville, Ont., despatch says: Gerald McEwen, of Moncton, has been presented with a watch and chain for saving a boy from drowning.

Fred Stohar, a prominent wholesale merchant of Winnipeg, has been arrested for firing four or five shots at three men who were bathing in the river close to his residence on Sunday.

The "Caribbean House," owned by Messrs Hall & Hatheway, Granville Ferry, N. S., was burned Tuesday night.

Charles Alexander, a Montreal confectioneer and ex-member of Parliament, has, it is stated, been proved legal heir of the vast estates in Scotland of the Earl of Stirling, the famous Sterling castle being part of the succession.

The two boys, Budd and Molina, charged with placing a trolley on the I. C. R. track near Moncton, have been sentenced to two years in Dorchester.

Another railway is likely to be built in the Ottawa Valley. It is to extend from Repulse to Portage du East, crossing the Ottawa river at that place and extending into Pontiac county as far as Thorne Centre.

A house owned and occupied by one McParlane, at Hawkeburg, York Co., was struck by lightning Monday afternoon.

The salmon run in the Fraser and Columbia rivers, in British Columbia, this season has been excellent.
