The winning run resulted from the first of Vaughn's bases on balls, the slip of the Chicago pitcher being followed by two sharp singles by Whiteman and McInnis.

The Cubs had only two good openings for runs, but both of them came with two men out. The game lacked almost all spectacular features which usually accompany a world series contest, but this had no effect on the quality of play, which was worthy of champion teams of major leagues. The fine pitching of the opposing left handers, Vaughn and Ruth, gave the fielders little chance for stunts and as a consequence the crowd had almost no opportunity to cheer.

Fred Mitchell Talks.

Chicago, Sept. 5.—"It was the first test of strength and the breaks were against us," said Fred Mitchell, manager of the Cubs tonight. "However, credit is due Ruth for his wonderful pitching. The Cubs ferreted out the weak spots of the Red Sox and the score will tell a different story tomorrow. I haven't decided who I shall pitch, but it is likely to be Tyler."

"We got the jump on them today and the Red Sox are confident of repeating tomorrow," said Manager Barrow, of the Boston club. "Ruth pitched great ball and I certainly shall start him back at the Cubs when we play in Boston. I haven't made up my mind who I shall pitch tomorrow. It will either be Mays or Bush. Baseball is a long way from dead, judging of the enthusiasm and size of today's crowd. We will even have a bigger opening day in Boston."

FASHION'S FANCIES
FOR FALL HEADGEARStandard Representative Sees
Some of the New and Beau-
tiful Effects For Autumn
Hats—What Will Be Worn
During the Winter of 1918.

Hats in bewildering array greeted the eyes of the Standard representative who visited the store of J. H. Marr & Company yesterday morning.

It is evident that many feminine thoughts are turning towards Fall millinery as each mirror reflected customers trying on some of this season's productions.

Talking with Mr. J. H. Marr he said that never had the styles been so pretty or so varied. Hats come in all sizes, large and small. A notable feature is the irregular line, few round shapes being shown, as the brims are cut off at the front and sides, the short sided shapes being particularly good for this year.

The newest colors are henna (a sort of light mahogany), paprika, taupe, gray, nigger, navy and purple tints. In trimmings, turquoise blue, pash blue and Oriental combinations are seen. Flowers are in gold, silver and metallic tints, made of worsted, felt or chenille. One peculiar trimming noticed was a cut felt fringe.

Worst stitching is still in favor. As one of the head milliners said, "The hats are simple, but have most elaborate trimmings on them." Chenille braid is formed into flowers or patterns or even whole crowns.

As to materials their name is legion. Hatter's plush or pressed beaver, as it is called, is seen combined with heavy cloth or velvet. Silk taffeta, silk velvet, panne velvet and velours are all there.

Ostrich is the leader for ornamentation, both curled and uncurled. Unstanding feather bands are still called for and wings come in every fancy color and design.

Crowns are mostly high or tam shaped with a peculiar accordion or telescope effect. A smoked crown was of sand colored satin, a decided novelty.

The Hindoo turban effect is seen both in crowns and brims. Among the lovely headgear noticed was one odd combination of velvet paprika and old blue. The shape had the new accordion crown which showed old blue silk facings. The trimming was a lovely French rose in pinky purple tints. The irregularly fashioned brim was faced with the blue silk softening the lines next the face.

A beautiful hat of black silk velvet high at the right side front band of corded turquoise ribbon about the high crown, two uncurled turquoise feathers mounted at the back. This is really a very charming chapeau.

A silver gray hat, brim short in front, and the sole ornament one pheasant wing in pash blue. Hat of nigger brown which showed old blue silk facings. The trimming was a lovely French rose in pinky purple tints. The irregularly fashioned brim was faced with the blue silk softening the lines next the face.
