YESTERDAY'S STOCK MARKET UPSET CALCULATIONS

Price Changes Were Nominal
With No Definite Trend at the Dull and Irregular End.

New York, Jan. 23.—The course of today's stock market upset the calculations of those speculative who hoped or feared, according to their count rates, would provoke fresh liquidations. Prices were mainly lower at the outset tending still lower for some of the more mercurial issues later, but in general changes were nominal without definite trend at the dull and irregular end.

The new rates of discount of the Federal Reserve Bank resulted in a slight advance of private all bank rates, but otherwise the money market was practically undisturbed. Supplies of call money were abundant at six per cent, though rising to eight in the afternoon and time funds eased a trifle, albeit again obtainable only in small amounts.

Two stocks stood out in the day's languid dealings and were typical of the general movement. Crucible Steel registered an extreme advance of 8 1/2 points, most of which was held, while General Motors declined seven points with very little recovery.

Other motor issues were irregular or heavy, with numerous specialties, but oils, steels, equipments and shipbuilding held to sustain the constructive account, while rails occupied the recent advance position. Sales amounted to 250,000 shares.

Heavy offerings of Liberty bonds and Victory notes, some of which were traceable according to popular belief to the higher discount imposed by the central bank. Other domestic issues were irregular, but international issues recovered early losses. Total sales, par value, aggregated \$2,275,000.

Old United States bonds were unchanged on call.

MILITARY TRAINING NATIONAL NEED, LEGION DECLARES

Delegation Appeals to Congress for Radical Changes in Present System.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 23.—The American Legion goes on record in favor of a policy of universal military training, in a hearing before the House Committee on Military Affairs. Former Representative Thomas W. Miller, of Delaware, chairman of the National Legislative Committee of the Legion, headed a delegation which presented resolutions for universal training adopted by the convention of the American Legion at Kings County.

In presenting the resolutions Mr. Miller asserted that failure to adopt such a policy was to endorse unpreparedness and that this was "national folly." He urged the continuance of training camps, the establishment of a separate air service, the reduction of the regular army to the "lowest numbers necessary," and that the general staff be "liberalized" by adding citizen officers, and that "all deadwood be eliminated."

They are strictly opposed to militarism or to the fostering of any military caste. They believe that the regular army should be reduced to the minimum numbers necessary for our foreign garrisons and other necessary professional duty; that our general staff should be liberalized by an admixture of competent citizen officers and that all such officers should be subjected to severe tests of fitness which would eliminate all deadwood.

Want Citizen Officers.
"They believed that this citizen's army should be trained, so far as possible, by citizen officers and its units localized in the territory from which they come, but that it must be trained solely as a national army under the authority of the national government for use only in time of war, and that the men must not be used to fill up the regular army."

"That this training shall be taken by the youth of the nation in their eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth years and shall be for a period of no less than four and not more than six months during the first year, to be followed by a two weeks' training period each year for two years."

CRUCIBLE STEEL JUMPED PRICE UP

(McDOUGALL & COWANS.)
New York, Jan. 23.—A vigorous advance in Crucible Steel at the expense of shorts which carried the price up six or eight points served to rally the list in the afternoon. The movement in that stock was accompanied by revivals of the story apparently based on information that the company contemplates a stock dividend in the proportion of something like 4 to 1, provided that the supreme court decides in a pending case that such dividends are not taxable as income. The tire and motor stocks remained generally soft, but elsewhere the list advanced moderately until shortly before the close. In the last half hour active stocks sold off from the top prices of the day. Call money advanced for a short time to 8 per cent, and then receded to 6 per cent. Sales 563,200.

THE PROPOSED HOME RULE BILL

In the House of Commons, England, the Prime Minister outlined the proposed new Home Rule Bill last night. He emphatically rejected the idea of a separation and declared that any attempt at secession would be fought, as the Northern States in America fought the Southern.

The main features of the Government's scheme are as follows:—The two Irish Legislatures, one for Ulster and the other for the rest of the country.

An Irish Council to consist of twenty representatives of each Irish Parliament.

The six Ulster counties to be the basis of the Ulster or Northern Parliament, with some adjustment.

If the two Legislatures agree to do so they can relegate various powers to the All Ireland Council.

If there is agreement at any time between them, the two parliaments can, without reference to the Imperial Parliament, become one Parliament for all Ireland.

The following services to be reserved to the Imperial Parliament:—The Crown. Peace and war. Foreign affairs. Army and Navy. Defence. Treason. Trade outside Ireland. Navigation. Wireless and cables. Trade marks. The higher judiciary.

The Irish Parliament to have full control over:—Education. Local government. Agriculture. Roads and bridges. Transportation (including railways). Old-age pensions. Insurance. Housing. Municipal affairs. Local judiciary. Licences. Machinery for the maintenance of law and order.

The Imperial Government retains control of the police for three years. Post Office remains with the Imperial Parliament.

Irish Government to have the revenue raised in Ireland, with the exception of £15,000,000 a year, the estimated "fair contribution" to the Imperial services.

A generous money surplus to be given to Ireland to build up Ireland a good start on Home Rule.

Customs and excise to remain in hands of Imperial Government until unity is obtained in Ireland.

Income-tax to remain in Imperial control.—London Press.

FREDERICTON CITY MARSHAL STRICKEN WITH PARALYSIS

Fredricton, Jan. 23.—City Marshal James Roberts was suddenly attacked with a paralytic stroke while walking on Brunswick street, yesterday afternoon, and this morning was said that his condition was so critical that his ultimate recovery is hardly expected.

City Marshal Roberts was born at Georgetown, and came to Fredericton about forty years ago. He was at one time a member of the police department and afterwards became city marshal and also acted as a private detective, as well as holding various other positions, including those of deputy sheriff of York County, bread inspector, server of tax notices, and agent of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty.

Lieut. Col. A. H. H. Powell, A. G., was back in his duties at headquarters yesterday morning, after an illness of several weeks on account of a broken arm.

BRAZILIAN AT THE FRONT ON MONTREAL

Montreal, Jan. 23.—Brazilian came to the front today as the active leader of the market with sales of 2500 shares. Close at 45½, showed net loss of half point. Atlantic Sugar was quieter than usual about 1400 shares changing hands. Steel fell to new low for the movement at 87 but recovered to 88½ at a close a net loss of 3½ points. Dominion Steel was strong, the close at 75 being a net rise of ½ point. Steel of Canada was weaker, losing a large fraction at 81½. Abitibi was down five points at 270 but nowhere else did the net loss reach two points.
