

THE BUILDING.

The present building of Wycliffe College was ready for occupation in October, 1882, and since that time has been used for the purposes of the College. It contains at present a comfortable residence for the Principal, and nineteen rooms for the Students, besides Lecture Rooms, &c. The building is now being enlarged, and when the present addition is completed will give accommodation for thirty-three Students. In addition to this there will be the Library, a large Refectory, 40 by 24 feet, and increased conveniences for the comfort of those living in the building. The most important part of the addition, however, is the Library, a handsome room 50 by 37 feet, and 20 feet high. This is erected by his family in memory of the late Hon. William Hume Blake, first Chancellor of Ontario, and Chancellor of the University of Toronto, and will form a useful and lasting memorial of that gifted man.

The building has been designed after the English Scholastic Gothic style, somewhat domesticated to meet the exigencies of the Canadian climate. With the present addition completed, it will still be in an unfinished condition. The Council hope that ere long they may be in possession of funds for the erection of a Chapel, and the other parts of the Building still required.
