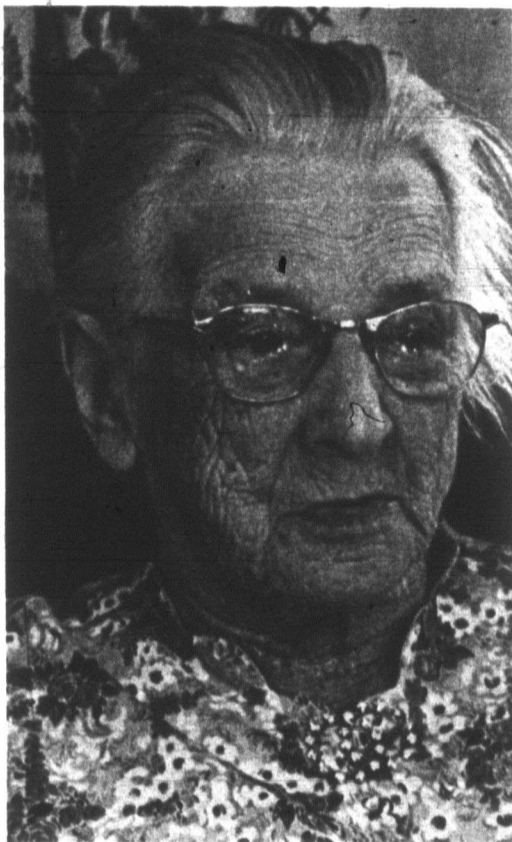

Billion dollar air contract for Douglas

Douglas Aircraft of Canada will manufacture the wings for the giant DC-10 airbus to be built by McDonnell Douglas Corp., of St. Louis. Although officials of the Malton plant still maintain "there is nothing of-

ficial to announce yet," a release by the parent American firm states the Douglas plants at Malton and Long Beach, California, and the McDonnell Aircraft installation at St. Louis will all be involved in producing the new jumbo jet.

Since the Canadian firm bid only to produce the wings of the DC-10, this is as much as saying Dacan has been awarded the contract.

A Dacan spokesman said this week, "While we have been pretty confident (of getting the contract), we have not been given authority to go ahead and spend any money."

An official announcement is expected this week on the contract which will mean about one billion dollars to the Mississauga company alone over a period of approximately 10 years.

Orders and options valued at nearly two billion dollars have already been placed for 110 aircraft by two American airlines. It is anticipated with the present expansion rate of air travel, some 1,300 jumbo jets will be needed by the world's major airlines in the next decade. Mc-

Madigan murder case ended

PORT CREDIT — Investigation into the death of 17-year-old Karen Madigan January 5, 1968, in her Port Credit apartment, has ended for the present, according to Det. Sgt. Bill Brooks of the Port Credit Police Department.

"Officially, the books are still open," said Sgt. Brooks, "but we have no further leads to track down at this time."

The girl's semi-nude body was discovered between twin beds in the Lakeshore rd. e. apartment she shared with her mother, Mrs. James Madigan, and brother James. A pair of nylon hose was knotted tightly
