September and to return not later than October let or Snd, very probably by one of the Horth German Lloyd steemers from Bremen or Liverpool on either of these dates. I have made tenative arrangements to sail by the "George Washington" of the North German Lloyd. leaving Bremen October let and Cherbourg October 2nd. I shall, therefore, probably be in Paris on October let. It would be a great delight to meet Mr. and Mrs. Jay and Miss McGook there, and I could then tell you of them on arrival in New York. I will endeavour to arrange my plans so as to be in Paris on October let, and will send a note to Miss McGook in care of the American Embassy at Paris a day or two before, in the hope that should she be in Paris when I reach there I may have the pleasure of seeing her on the way to Cairo and of renewing my friendship with Mr. and Mrs. Jay.

Again I would like to say how sorry I am not to have had part of this month with you all at Seabright. It would have been the happiest of pleasures.

I am glad to be able to give you in pamphlet form, the information you desire in reference to the interchange of students between this country and other parts of the British Empire and the United States. You will find the pemphlet enclosed, and it will, I think, give you the information you wish. I might mention that Mr. Henry W. Grees, the Honourary Secretary of the Association, is at present in America. I have given your name to the executive of the Association here, and it is quite probable that Mr. Grees will call upon you when in New York on the 13th instant or later. Should you wish to communicate with him a letter addressed in care of Columbia University will be duly forwarded. At the present time his communications are being sent to him in care of HoGill University. Montreal, but after the 13th of the month it would be well to address him in care of Columbia University.

I was sorry to learn that Mrs.Alexander had not been as well as formerly. I shall be pleased if you would give her my kind remembrances and express the hope that despite advancing years her health may remain unimpaired for some time to come.
