#### Grand Jury on Hochelaga Fire.

The lamentable tragedy caused by the Hochelaga school fire recently called for the following comment from the Grand Jury.

"We wish first to express our deep sympathy with the bereaved parents in their great sorrow, and we wish to add to the universal words of praise bestowed upon the late Miss Maxwell for her courage, faithfulness and devotion to duty in seeking the protection of the children ommitted to her charge.

"We note with great satisfaction that there is a movement on foot to perpetuate her noble deed by a fitting memorial.

"The Grand Jury feel it to be their ounden duty in the public interest to give as their judgment that a searching inquiry should be imme diately prosecuted, and the parties at fault should be brought to public notice. The Protestant School Commissioners are in our opinion resting under a grave responsibility in not carrying out the orders of the city authorities by placing escapes on the school buildings under their charge.

"The individual opinions regarding the efficiency of fire escapes as protection is no reason for their in-

"The city officials show in this matter a lack of authority in the enforcement of the city by-laws, and it is our opinion that the law re specting fire escapes should be immediately enforced without fear or fa vor. This refers not only to the Protestant School Commissioners buildings, but to all school buildings in the city, and all buildings of any character where life is in danger by fire.

"We feel that the cfty firemen, although on this occasion they did good service, yet they have to answer satisfactorily to the public why the late Miss Maxwell was permit ted to re-enter the burning building when they must have known that she was risking her life.

### Thomas Foley, Famous Contractor, Dead,

St. Paul, Minn., March 5 .- Thomas Foley, member of the firm of Foley Bros. and Kelly, wholesale grocers, and Foley Bros., the large railroad contracting firm has died at St. Joseph's Hospital, following an operation. Mr. Foley had been ailing about a year, and was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital about three weeks ago. His condition continued grow steadily worse.

Mr. Foley was born 68 years e in Lanark County, Ontario, and lived in Canada until 1881, when, with his brothers, he moved to St. Cloud, Minn., where the four tractors and also as lumber dealers.
