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New regulations for the luxury and other taxes came into force November 1st. One requires that wholesalers dealing in articles coming under the retail luxury tax must not sell to retailers unless the latter have their license, which costs \$2. The luxury tax is to be collected by means of stamps which may be secured from the department, all customs offices or from the banks. Machines required for cancelling stamps by perforation will be issued on loan to merchants.

Killed By Lightning.

During the severe electrical storm that passed over this district on Monday evening and which was especially severe around Linwood and Hawkesville, lightning struck the barn belonging to Mr. Valentine Foerster, near Hawkesville, killing him and two horses and a cat, which was sitting at his feet. Mrs. Foerster, who was engaged in milking a few feet away escaped unhurt. There were two holes burned in Mr. Foerster's shirt and his breast was singed. A peculiar thing about the incident was a horse at each end of the stable was killed and those between escaped. The gable end of the barn was also damaged but fortunately there was no fire started. Mr. Foerster had no family, but is survived by his wife. He was 49 years of age.

The few deer left in the woods in Old Ontario will be further protected by the Department of Fish and Game. An order in Council has gone through making it illegal to kill deer in the counties of Simcoe, Wellington, Grey and Dufferin for the next three years. Deer in Greenock township in the County of Bruce, cannot be killed legally for the next four years. There are still a few deer in these districts and the Department desires to preserve them.

Hon. F. C. Biggs, Minister of Public Works and Highways, said in his latest public utterance in regard to the good roads policy, that in the opinion of the department it is better to have one hundred miles of good driving highway than ten miles of perfect construction, and they were working on that principle. Within three years he hoped that throughout Ontario all the system mapped out as provincial highways would be completed. Afterwards would come the question of turning them into permanent roads of cement or asphalt. "It is only three months," Mr. Biggs declared, "since the session of the Provincial Legislature closed, when we secured the necessary legislation to proceed with our plans, and already great progress has been made. With the exception of a very few short sections the roads to be incorporated in the provincial highways have all been designated and taken over. Twenty stone crushing plants were at work, over three hundred gravel pits and stone quarries were purchased, and twenty trucks were hauling the materials to their destination. By next spring the organization will be complete and the work rushed.
