ST. MARK'S CHURCH, ST. GEORGE The annual financial meeting of St. Mark's Church was held on Wednesday, Jan. 17. The Auditor's report showed that \$1101.58 has been raised for church purposes. The expenditure showed \$1122.58, leaving a deficit of \$21.00 to be made up. Of the amount raised paid out the "Parish Aid" had contributed \$192.35. Spent in repairs, etc.

In addition to the above about \$100.00 had been raised for objects outside the parish of a missionary character.
