GREAT WORK BY THE WOMEN

But Funds are Still Needed
For the Brant Tuberculosis
Hospital.

Great work by the women of Brantford and throughout the county is being done in connection with the new tuberculosis hospital but the announcement was made to-day that very little funds were really in the hands of the governors wherewith to complete the furnishing of the new institution. It was announced this morning that the hospital was rapidly nearing final completion, the only difficulty being encountered being that of the matter of funds for furnishings. In this connection the various Women's Institutes are doing great work and taking great interest in the hospital. The local order of Daughters of the Empire has assumed the work of hospital auxiliary, and propose to raise, from \$300 to \$400. The ladies of the Moyle-Tranquility Institute are supplying 35 pillows, while the Paris Women's Institute will supply much-needed linen. The North Brant Women's Institute has promised to donate \$500 for a shack to be known as the North Brant Women's Institute shack on hospital grounds. Another women's organization is also proposing to assist substantially. An appeal is being made to all societies to help as it is

conceded that the work of the hospital is almost the most important of its kind.

Brantfordites will be interested in the following despatch from Washington on the Senate investigation into indignities which the suffragettes recently suffered in that city: "Mrs. Gilbert H. Grosvenor, daughter of Alexander Graham Bell, the celebrated inventor, told the committee that rowdies pulled flags from the hands of her children who were in the parade in an automobile, and tore decorations off the car. Gross indignities and insults suffered by women paraders in the suffragette parade were further recounted to the committee. Dr. Nellie B. Mark of Baltimore, a marcher, said that she saw another young girl among the Maryland delegation 'chucked' under the chin by a rowdy and another man trying to put his arm around her. 'I lit one man on the nose with my baton,' said Dr. Mark. 'He fled into the crowd. Some other man tried to pinch another girl, and I struck him in the mouth. He gulped, and I think his teeth went down. One woman had her arm pinched black and blue to the elbow by the crowd as she marched along. I saw another girl with her coat nearly torn off. The Maryland flag we carried was spit on by the men, and they threw lighted cigarettes at it. The police jeered when they saw drunken men fall in front of us.' Mrs. Mark said the attitude of the police was that of 'jellyfish indifference.'"

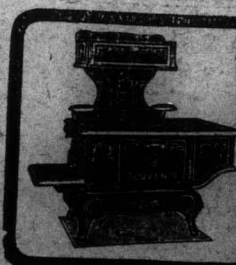

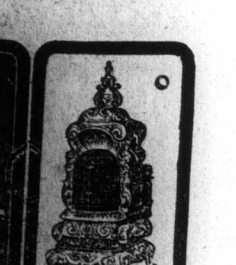
