TWO TURKISH SHIPS ARE SUNK

Russian Submarine Does Some Good Work in the Black Sea.

By Special Wire to the Courier.

Petrograd, July 3.—The activity of a Russian submarine in the Black Sea is recounted in an official statement issued by the admiralty to-day. The undersea boat sank two Turkish steamers and one sailing vessel, with cargoes of coal and provisions, and then exchanged shots with three armed schooners off the mouth of the Bosphorus, driving them ashore.

The text of the statement follows: "A Russian submarine in the Black Sea to-day torpedoed and sank a steamer of 2,500 tons. It then set fire to and sank a sailing ship of 1,500 tons. Subsequently a small steamer was sent to the bottom. The three vessels were in the neighborhood of Kesken, and were laden with coal and provisions."

"The submarine also shelled another steamer anchored in the river and several coal laden barges and a tug were driven ashore."

"Near the mouth of the Bosphorus the submarine came into action with an armed schooner. After an exchange of shots this vessel, with two others of a similar type were run ashore."

SHELED TRAINS Pretoria, July 3.—Two British aeroplanes successfully bombed German troop trains at Oravi, German South-west Africa, it was announced yesterday. Nearly 100 German soldiers are believed to have been killed.

AUSTRIAN SUB SUNK Rome, July 3.—A French aviator bombed and sank the Austrian submarine U-11 in the Adriatic, the Ministry of Marine announced to-day.

This is the second time in naval history that a submarine has been sunk by an aeroplane. The German War Office announced a few days ago that a German aeroplane sank a Russian submarine.

The Austrian U-11 was one of the newest of Austria's submarines, and displaced about 860 tons. She was supposed to carry a crew of about 25 men.

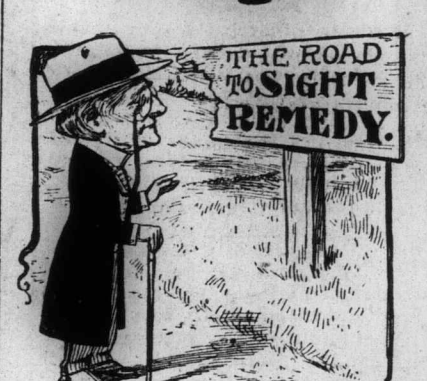
