RECORD WHEAT CROP

By Courier Leased Wire

Washington, Dec. 17.—The largest winter wheat crop ever grown in the history of the United States is promised by the enormous acreage sown this fall. The acreage is almost 18 per cent. larger than last year's and totals 49,027,000 acres. A crop of 765,000,000 bushels or 80,000,000 bushels more than the best record is forecasted by the Department of Agriculture as next year's winter wheat yield, allowing for winter killing and spring abandonment. Last year's crop was 565,725,000 bushels.

Bulgars Ask Compensation

CABLE despatches from correspondents with the Allied armies now in Bulgaria indicate that the Bulgars have not as yet decided to amend their attitude toward established facts, and to cease putting forward their usual ridiculous pretensions regarding Macedonia and Thrace.

It is apparent from the despatches sent by correspondents that these pretensions have taken a new form—the form of "compensation." This is an improvement on the past. A year ago these same pretensions took the form of extermination. Unable to muster sufficient nationals in Macedonia and still less in Thrace, the Bulgars endeavored to exterminate the Greeks, Turks and Serbs who resolutely refused to abandon their own national traditions and religion.

And so, now, the old pretensions are clothed in a new and more palatable cloak of "compensation." "Let Serbia," the Bulgars say, "expand toward the north and the Adriatic, let Greece take the islands and some of the Balkan Peninsula, and let Rumania have the Macedonia which she covets." In another paragraph we read that besides Macedonia, they are convinced that both the Dobroudja and Cavalla will be assigned to them. Apparently, then, they are unable to understand the fact that if Serbia expands to the north and the Adriatic, it is because the Balkan regions are inhabited by people who speak the same language and have the same national traditions as the Serbs; and that if Greece received the islands and the Dobroudja, it is because the same justification holds good, seeing that the Dodecanese Islands, now under the military occupation of Italy, to which they were, until recently, Greek populations, and the district of Smyrna, in Asia Minor, for instance, contains no fewer than 245,000 Greek inhabitants.

Now everybody knows that the Dobroudja, which the Bulgars claim and which was recently wrested from Rumania by the abominable treaty imposed on the latter by the Germans and Bulgars, is inhabited by Rumanians. As regards Macedonia and Cavalla, I can again quote exact figures. In the district of Cavalla, for instance (Cavalla, Drama, Nestos, etc.) at least 121,181 August 1915, 96,042 orthodox Greeks and only 3,904 foreign inhabitants by no means always pure Bulgars. In the district of Serres, Zichne, etc., there were on the same date 68,098 orthodox Greeks and 12,260 Slavophones. Why on earth, then, should Bulgaria expand its territory inhabited by races that are entirely except Bulgarian?

It cannot be claimed that the figures quoted above are orthodox Greek. It is, therefore, a very easy matter to locate the Greek element. The latter, being under the jurisdiction of the Greek Patriarch in religion, and naturally Greek in tradition and national consciousness, will be found in the Greek churches, where divine service has been held in the Greek language from the day when Saint Paul landed at Salonica. The Bulgars being schismatics in religion, and under the jurisdiction of the Bulgarian church, do not attend the Greek orthodox churches. The dividing line is, therefore, clearly and definitely marked. Nothing that the Bulgars have said or will say can alter established facts and no method, whether old or new, whether in the form of extermination or compensation, can justify their claims to territories in which they are aliens from every point of view.

Not only do justice and humanity claim such a declaration, but Holland herself would never feel safe from German oppression if she were in any way to attempt to exonerate Germany's conduct with regard to Belgium.

For these reasons it is the prevailing view here that the complete independence and restoration of Belgium must be placed as a first and foremost condition, before Holland can lend her kind offices towards peace.

The Shell of an Egg.

It is not so, but scientists have established the fact that the average pressure under which white eggs break is 112 pounds, says Popular Science Monthly. Strange to say, brown eggs are stronger than white ones. It takes a pressure averaging 155 pounds to break them, the minimum being 125 pounds and the maximum 175 pounds. When it is considered that the thickness of an average egg shell is .013 and three-quarter inches, some idea may be formed of their enormous resistance.
