### MYSTIC METER

lanus is a former pastor of St. Jos-The plaintiff, however, claims that the agreements in the lease were not carried out by the defendant. was forced to leave the house on account of poor board and the other agreements in the lease were not lived up to.

The Plaintiff's claim is that the al-

leged lease be declared void by reason of fraud, misrepresentation and de-ceit practiced by the defendant and Pinsonneault upon her. That the ease does not represent the bargain made, and should be set aside or reformed so as to conform to the bargain, and that the defendant should pay to the plaintiff the value of her board since she left her home, and also the value of one-third of the fall wheat crop of this year and give up immediate possession of the property The plaintiff is an aged lady and the farm is her only means of support. After the plaintiff's evidence, Dr McKeough testified that shortly before the plaintiff left Mr Daniel's she came to him and complained of receiving improper diet.
