## HE SAW HIS OWN GRAVE PREPARED

Then had his Death Sentence Commu-  
ted—An Incident in South Africa.

Colesberg, April 10.—An intelligence  
officer stationed at Petrusville was  
threatened by Commandant Hertzog  
with death, by shooting, in the event  
of his being caught. The officer sub-  
sequently accompanied the troops in the  
Orange River Colony, and was  
captured at Jagersfontein, tried, and  
sentenced to death by Hertzog. He  
was kept waiting until the sentence  
was confirmed by De Wet. He was  
then made to witness the digging of  
his own grave. When the time came  
for his execution, he was told that  
he was let off, this time. The officer  
was practically stripped of his cloth-  
ing, and then released.

AN INJUSTICE.  
"The water commissioners did a serious  
injustice to the landlords," said Judge

the tenants' gas bills or even butcher bills  
against them. What the commissioners  
should do is to turn the water off when the  
rate is not paid."
