IS WELL ATTENDED

Re-union of Latter-Day Saints is Drawing Very Large Crowds

At 2:30 p. m. in the Grand Opera House the assembly of the Latter Day Saints re-union was in charge of President Evans, Elder A. Levan, being the speaker. His discourse was from Matt. 20, "The Householder." The assembly was quite large and attentive, though interrupted some by workmen on the roof.

At 8 p. m. the services were in charge of Elder S. Brown, President Evans being the speaker for the hour. This sermon was treating on the "Unchangeableness of God," and was well received by the large assembly, and so closed the day with grateful hearts for past and present favors.

On Wednesday a number of the men folks met at the church at 8 a. m. to cut up some of the trees that were broken off by the recent storm, and they put in two hours faithful work with dull axes and saws in cutting the timber into wood.

The prayer service at 9 a. m. was in charge of Elder F. B. Blair, of Lamoni, Iowa, business manager of the Board of Publication, and Elder B. St. John. Quite a social time was spent.

At the close of the prayer service a session was held by the Religious. At 2:30 p. m. the assembly vacated the Grand Opera House and repaired to the Saints Chapel on account of the noise made by the workmen on the roof of the Opera House. The speaker for the hour was Elder S. Brown, his subject being on the "Duty of the Saints." The service was in charge of Elder Green.

At the close of this service a mock parliament and drill with song service was held by the Religious for an hour's session, in charge of Elders Blair and A. R. Hewitt.

At 8 p. m. the preaching services were in charge of Elder B. St. John, President Evans being the speaker of the hour. His discourse was on the "Manciple, Christ."

The sermon was well received by congregation.

Thursday, June 14th. The usual morning prayer service was in charge of the Presidency, it being an intellectual feast.

After a social greeting of a few minutes, the assembly was called to order by Pres. Evans, Elder F. B. Blair, of Lamoni, Iowa, being the speaker. His address was relative to the necessity and success of Graceland College. It was well received.

THE COUNTY COURT

Cases Which Come Before Judge Dowlin Are of Great Interest

The case of the G. T. R. vs. Lebu, an action to recover damages for the killing of Lebu's horse on the defendant's track, was decided at the County Court yesterday in favor of the railway company.

The other civil case was an action brought by Gilbert & Co. against the M. C. R. Judgment was given for the plaintiffs.

Wm. Ansley, the young man who attempted suicide in Howard Township by cutting his throat, was remanded for a week.

The Burr case, in which the defendant is charged under the Charlestown Act, is now in progress.

The following is the Grand Jury's presentation:

To His Honor, Judge Dowlin.
Your Honor—We your Grand Jury of the present County Court, beg leave to report as follows.

That having heard the evidence laid before us we have returned true bills in all the indictments presented by the Crown Attorney.

That while hearing the evidence on three of the indictments it came to our knowledge that a feature of last Victoria Day celebration in Chatham was the permission—given various parties to carry on the gambling business known as bookmaking. We would respectfully urge that the officers of the law be instructed to promptly suppress by all legal means any future attempts to carry on this or any other form of gambling either in Chatham or any other place in the county.

That we have visited the gaol and found it neat, well kept and in good condition. We note with sad feeling the recent expenditures by the County Council in the walls, which have added to the safety and security of the gaol, and also on the house, which have added to the comfort of the officials. There are now in confinement seven prisoners and two insane persons awaiting removal to the asylum. We would suggest that if the duty of removing these to the asylum were placed in the hands of the Sheriff it would be more promptly performed than as now, when they have to await the arrival of a Provincial officer and during which time serious results might follow, and during which the insane lose the benefit of that prompt treatment which would probably be of the greatest benefit.

That we also visited the House of Refuge where 45 inmates find a comfortable home. We found the buildings well kept and the fields looked prosperous. The caretaker was in the fields with a number of the inmates carrying on farming operations and your jurors were conducted through the building by the matron.

That we also visited the Home for the Friendless, where we found twenty-two inmates. The institution is evidently well looked after, and the inmates are comfortably cared for.

THE LATE MR LEWIS

Rev. J. Pitt Lewis, whose sudden and, indeed, tragic death is recorded to-day, died as he no doubt wished—at his post. With occasional intervals for travel and rest, Dr. Lewis labored for 28 years in the most densely-populated part of the city with a fidelity that could not be surpassed. He was a preacher of exceptional power, a man of high scientific attainments, and an indefatigable parish worker. To his flock he was something more than the rector. Very close to all his parishioners, particularly in times of trouble, he was a valued friend to every member of his congregation. The end of the long period of toil will bring sorrow to many homes.—Mail and Empire.
