Local and Provincial.

The Local Legislature meets next Thursday.

Rev. H. F. Adams, of Truro, will address the missionary meeting in College Hall on Sunday afternoon at 3 p. m.

Rev. Dr. Higgins administered the rite of baptism to fourteen candidates at the Baptist church last Sunday evening. The church was crowded.

The Athlone Society are to have their regular yearly "at home" this evening in Assembly Hall. A large number of invitations have been issued.

In the future the marks of the College students will be arranged in three grades. The grade of each student in each subject will be published, beginning at the end of the present term.

The alleged poisoning case at Bridge-town was again taken up on Wednesday, when the report of Mr. McIntyre, the analyst, was received. The report, which is a lengthy one and very minute in detail, shows that no trace of morphine was found.

Mr. W. S. Wallace has again returned to Wolfville and intends opening up a tailoring business in the shop of Mr. L. P. Godfrey, which is now being fitted up for him. He has moved into the house on Keene street, formerly occupied by Mr. George Franklin.

It may be a great temptation to those who have fast horses, but the practice is a very dangerous one, and makes it very unpleasant for pedestrians.

The militia department recently issued a return showing the efficiency of the various cavalry corps of the Dominion. King's Canadian Hussars stand at the head of the list with 130 points to their credit out of possible 164. The Princess Louise Dragoon Guards at Ottawa and the Winnipeg Troop came second, each having made 98 points. It is apparent, therefore, that the King's county troop is far ahead of all competitors.

The residence of Mr. W. C. Archibald had a narrow escape from being destroyed by fire yesterday morning. It seems that one of the children had been left alone in a room and had in some way procured matches and set the bedding on fire. Fortunately it was discovered in time and the flames were extinguished. No alarm was given so the firemen were not out. Starr, the dwelling would undoubtedly have been destroyed.

We are glad to learn of the advancement of Mr. Walter Newcombe to the position of station agent at Kentville, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. R. Dow. The place is one of trust, and the appointment speaks well for the confidence of the company in friend Walter. During Mr. Newcombe's residence here as assistant in the station he won many warm friends who will be pleased to learn of his success.

We have received the first copy of the new maritime live-stock and agricultural journal, *Clarke's Monthly*, published by Mr. M. H. Clarke, of Margarettville. It is from the press of the Bridgetown Monitor, and its mechanical appearance reflects credit upon the printer. Use about a teaspoon to each person. Allow the infusion to stand only from five to seven minutes before pouring out first cups; after pouring these out, add enough hot water for second cups. Very long infusion spoils good tea, bringing out the tannin which imparts a bitter flavor. The finer the tea, the more it suffers from long drawing.

If tea must be kept some time drawn, it is always best to pour off the infusion at the proper time into a second teapot, leaving the tea leaves out. All that portion of the tea that can be dissolved is extracted before the expiration of ten minutes! the infusion is then at its best; from that time, if allowed to stew, it loses its flavor and becomes dull and bitter.

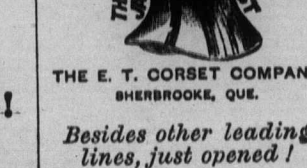
