LEGAL DECISIONS.

Any person who takes a paper regis-
tered under the Post Office—whether it
be his own name or another's or whether
it is a newspaper or not—is responsible
for the contents.

If a person orders his paper discon-
tinued, he must pay up all arrearages, or
the publisher may continue to send it until
he is made, and collect the whole
amount, whether the paper is taken from
him or not.

The courts have decided that refu-
sal to take newspapers and periodicals
at the Post Office, or removing and
not paying for them, is prima facie
evidence of intentional fraud.
