

Brookville on Dominion Day, for a purse of \$1,000—\$500 to first, \$300 to second, \$200 to third—several race, four miles and a turn. The parties contesting were: Edward Hanlan, Toronto; F. A. Plaised, Boston; John Kennedy, Portland; James H. Riley, Saratoga; J. A. Ten Eyck, Peabackill; A. Elliott, Toronto; P. Luther, Pittsburg; W. McKen, Toronto.

Just at the report of the pistol Kennedy caught the water, then came Plaised, and just after him Hanlan, after which the others went in a bunch. The long clean stroke of the Toronto champion soon sent him to the front, however, though he was pulling only thirty strokes per minute, and before the contestants had gone a hundred yards he was leading the party by about two lengths. Next came Kennedy, who led Elliott by a length, and a length behind Hanlan, the rest of the party were bunched. Half a mile down the course Hanlan was still holding a commanding lead with his thirty to the minute stroke, while Riley, Kennedy, Ten Eyck, and Luther were pretty well bunched in the order named, the others being all well up.

At the end of the first mile Hanlan was leading by fully five lengths, while Riley, Plaised, and Kennedy, were neck and neck, so to speak, with McKen dangerously close to them and the others not far off. Of course it was now clear that only an accident could defeat Hanlan, and he continued to widen the gap between himself and the others during the whole of the second mile. As he neared the party were buoy, however, he steered rather wildly, and must have lost ground perceptibly. He turned with a lead of seven lengths. Kennedy came next, two and a half lengths ahead of Riley and McKen, who turned together. Then came Plaised, coming close upon them; then Ten Eyck, Elliott, and Luther, all close together. As they straightened away on the homeward stretch Riley lost ground slightly by hugging the shore too closely, and both Plaised and McKen got the best of him in the first half of the third mile. Kennedy still holding to second place with a tenacity that did great credit to the pluck and endurance of the "little one." McKen, who was in the fourth place, now made a vigorous start, pulling something like 36 or 37 strokes to the minute, and in a few seconds he was almost on even terms with the lightning sculler of Boston. But just at this moment, as he was hugging the shore to keep out of the water, a large skiff shot out from under the thick foliage that overhangs the bank, and striking his rowlock, capsize his skiff, and left him floundering in the water. He was soon safe again, however, but of course his chance of a place in the race was lost. About this time Elliott also became entangled with a skiff, and afterwards with a small steamer, and although he pulled home and finished sixth, with his boat half full of water, he had no hope of winning a place with a leaky boat, after having been twice fouled by outsiders.

As the third mile was finished Hanlan was leading by fully ten lengths, and pulling only 27 strokes to the minute. Then came Plaised, who had fully captured the Portland man, and after him came Riley, the others being by this time practically out of it. From this to the finish the contest was one of little or no interest. Riley gave it up more than a quarter of a mile from the finish, and while Hanlan merely paddled home a dozen lengths ahead, pulling only about 27 to the minute, Plaised, fell so sure of second place that he did not exert himself to do anything more than to lead Kennedy over the score. Riley was a bad fourth, Ten Eyck a bad fifth, with Elliott not far off, and Luther pulling quietly up under the protection of one of the patrol boats, while McKen was, of course, out of it.

The time as given by outside timers varied from 23m. 27s. to 23m. 50s. From the start to the finish Hanlan pulled a slower stroke than any of the other contestants.

The race took place as follows—Hanlan first, Plaised second, McKen third, Riley fourth, Ten Eyck fifth, Elliott sixth, Luther seventh, and McKen eighth.


