

A CHANCE FOR THE BOY

HOW ROYAL AIR FORCE WILL TRAIN APPRENTICES.

Will Be Trained as Skilled Craftsmen, as Large Numbers Will Be Required to Operate the British Air Routes Which Are to Be Started Throughout the World.

Within a few years there will be large numbers of well-paid jobs going to men having expert knowledge of aircraft. British air routes are rapidly spreading through the world, and the companies operating them will require many more skilled mechanics in the near future.

At present opportunities for learning the various aircraft trades are limited. The manufacturing firms employ skilled labor, and so do the aerial transport companies.

The only method of obtaining training is by entering the Air Force. Owing to the decision of the Imperial Government to increase the strength of the R.A.F. for home defence purposes, a large number of boys are shortly to be engaged as aircraft apprentices, when they will be trained as skilled craftsmen, and after a few years' service returned to civil life.

By the time their service is up the civilian air jobs will be waiting to be filled.

Next January approximately 950 boys, between the ages of 15 and 18 1/2, will be required for the Air Force.

Boys desiring to fill these vacancies must enter for a competitive examination, which consists of papers in mathematics, experimental science, English, and a general paper.

It should be borne in mind that local educational authorities can, on the suggestion of headmasters of schools, nominate boys for a special Air Ministry examination.

The 950 successful candidates will be sent to the School of Technical Training at Halton, Buckinghamshire, to undergo instruction for three years in the various trades which make up the R.A.F. They will be given an excellent general education by civilian school masters, and trained thoroughly in one or other of the trades, the boys being invited to indicate their preference.

The principal trades are carpenter, fitter, cooper, smith, wireless operator, mechanic, electrician, instrument maker, and draughtsman.

During the period of training there is careful supervision of health and general welfare, medical attendance and recreation. Six weeks' annual leave is granted.

Pay is given from the commencement at the rate of 1s. 6d. a day until the age of 18, and then at 3s. 3d. a day until the course is completed. In addition, boys are fed, clothed, and housed free.

At the end of the three years' training the successful apprentice must sit for the passing-out examination for promotion to the rank of leading aircraftsman, with pay varying from 5s. 2d. to 5s. 6d. per day. After four years' service the mechanic is free to return to civil life.

A certain number of the most promising boys are sent on the completion of their course to the R.A.F. Cadet College at Cranwell for training in flying as commissioned officers. Others are given advanced courses so that they may qualify later in flying.

There are excellent opportunities for boys who are keen on flying and wish to obtain a training which would normally cost hundreds of pounds.

Smallest Church.

Ringed with poppies now is the tiny church at Lullington, England, beneath the shadow of the chalk downs near Ayrton; their red tongues lick the trunks of the encircling ash grove, and honeyed fans of daisy blossom beckon round the door.
