KNOWLESVILLE MAN DROWNED

On Tuesday, Oct. 5, the drowning
took place of Fred C. Kenney of
Knowlesville, who since his return
from overseas, where he served with
the rank of corporal, has been en-
gaged with the New Brunswick forest
service.

It was while employed with a party
engaged in timber cruising on the
headwaters of the Miramichi, about
48 miles northwest of Newcastle, that
he unfortunately lost his life. He
was last seen alive when he left his
camp for a short hunting trip on Tues-
day, and as he did not return to camp
when expected a searching party was
organized. A canoe was found over-
turned on a small lake in the vicinity
and later the body of the unfortunate
man was found in the water. There
was no witness of the sad occur-
rence but it is presumed that Mr.
Kenney went on the lake in the canoe
and that in some manner it was over-
turned and, as he could not swim very
well, he was unable to save himself.

The sad death of Mr. Kenney, who
was a very popular young man, has
cast a gloom over the remainder of
his party, and their sincere sympathy
together with that of his many friends
goes out to the family in their sad
bereavement. Deceased was 28 years
of age and is survived by his father
and mother, Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Ken-
ney, of Knowlesville, four brothers
and two sisters.
