Bridgeport, Conn., March 13.—Fire in a six family tenement house here early today caused the death of three men and may result in the death of a fourth, and endangered the lives of onearly sixty others.

The fire broke out in the basement and ate its way rapidly up through the partitions, filling the house with dense smoke. The dead-men were found suffocated and burned in a small sleeping room on the first floor. The fourth man, who is now at the hospital in a serious condition, was found unconsclous on the second floor, where the occupants were awakened by the police. They rushed panies tricken about the building but made no effort to leave it and had to be driven out by a large force of policemen. The loss by fire was not heavy.
