Therefore, resolved, that the secretary of the county council be requested to call on the Councils of the parishes of the Union of Municipalities of the province of New Brunswick to bring the matter to the attention of the said Councils, and to request them to make a report on the matter, and to ask the said Union to take the action in the matter, and if necessary to take steps to test the right of the government to make the parishes pay for the lunatics. The council adjourned till Thursday morning.

In a few days two young men will start from Vancouver to break the record for a 500 mile trip over ice and snow to the Yukon delta district.

These young men will carry His Majesty's mail to he far outposts of civilization established by the Company of Gentlemen of the North of England, trading into Hudson Bay, and incidentally into many other parts of the great fur producing sections of the continent.

They are Frank Watson, both experienced trail riders and trail followers. They are at present busy outfitting and it is a reflection on some people who are so sure of themselves about bringing the northern trade to Vancouver that they have been forced to send to Seattle for sleds and other necessary pack animals.

They have secured two splendid dog teams and they figure on making the snow melt under their runners until in far Fort Graham they will have to be cautiously awaited news from the outer world.

They will go from here by steamer to Kitamat, thence over the ice to the mouth of the Skeena, across the lake, over Babine lake to Conley lake, calling at old Fort Conley, across the country to Ingineeka river, down the river to the mouth of the Skeena, and then to the Findlay to Fort Graham. They will take about 500 pounds of mail matter.

Having delivered their mail, they will then cannot pick up a claim on the Finley where big strikes in tin and gold have recently been made.

Dr. C. G. Wagner of Birmingham, N. Y., and Dr. E. D. Evans of Morris Plains, N. J., both superintendents of State Institutions for the Insane were on the stand today. Detailing their conversations with the deceased, the two physicians were asked clearly two questions which were answered. It was in 1901 that they met Thaw the first time. The first of these was that Thaw told them in 1900 he was a graduate of Stanford University and a member of the University of Squaw Garden. He left early and was accused of breaking up the party. Some of the guests did not eat much that day. It was in 1901 that they met him again. He told them that he who sat next to him declared that the food was bad.

Thaw also told the physicians a story the first time he saw Evelyn. He said that he was in front of a theater. "A pure looking girl" he described her. If she was, he was told, she was. Thaw said that she was named Nesbit and that she belonged to the family of the Thaw manager, subsequently to meet the girl at an after-supper in company with several other stage persons.

According to some observers here, the Dowager Empress appears to be growing weaker, but this evidently is due to her advanced age. Her declining powers and her internal difficulties have come upon her at one and the same time, and that she has failed to make use of the abilities of Yuan Shih Kai, the man that she hands down and powerless.

Indo-China has repeatedly sent war- riffs to Pekin of the dangers attending the revolutionary movements on the Tongking border, where the course pursued by the rebels has provoked trouble from Tongking, which is a French pro- vince, to cross over into the Chinese provinces of Kwang Shai and Kwang Tung. The foreign board has protested, at the French minister here, M. Baps, has replied with adequate assurances

MONCTON, Friday.—Aldermen in two wards for Moncton have been elected by acclamation, while there will be contests for the mayoralty, aldermen-at-large, and in Ward Three. Civic nominations closed this afternoon at five o'clock. The mayoralty contest will be between Dr. C. P. Turpud and George B. Willett. For aldermen-at-large there have been nominated Jos. Gardiner, Andrew H. Jones, and Arthur Bell. The contest in Ward Two will be between McLeod and Crandall, the present alderman for that division, and J. M. Ross. Those elected by acclamation are: the Temple Port Bell; the aldermen-at-large, Ward One, William D. Martin and John H. Crandall; Ward Three. The civic fight will be along temperance lines, the socialist being the burning question in Moncton at present. In Ward Two candidates elected for the year. Both candidates endorsed in Ward Three have been elected by the Local Temperance Federation. The candidates for aldermen-at-large have received the approval of the body, and two of the candidates for aldermen-at-large. Dr. Purdy is the mayoralty candidate endorsed by the Temperance people.

to China, is today sanguine of a swift and quiet solution of the Wanchow problem. This attitude is due to the prevalence of piracy on this waterway, which Great Britain is now policing with a small fleet of gunboats. Sir John Lubbock, British minister in Shanghai, has just returned from his tour as the province of Kwang-Tung. He conceded a claim of 80,000 teals for piracy outrages.

A British gunboat, while searching for pirates on the West river, recently stopped and boarded a French boat. As soon as the nationality of the suspected vessels was made known, the boat was released and proceeded on her way.

The course of action followed in Great Britain with regard to Manchuria, is expected to ultimately determine whether or not capital other than Japanese will be permitted to find investments in that territory.

The evacuation of the Chungi Valley in Tibet, by British troops is being delayed, among other things by the necessity of settling the question whether Thibet shall be included in the provisions of the Anglo-Chinese treaty concerning Tibetan trade. It is hoped that the British will come to an agreement, and that an understanding to this effect will shortly be signed.
