

### NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY COUNCIL.

NEWCASTLE, Friday.—Northumberland County Council opened in the Council chamber, Newcastle, Tuesday morning, January 21st, Warden T. W. Flett in the chair. There were present the following councillors: Aldrick—Wm. Anderson, Wm. L. Allain, Blackie—Geo. Hayes, M. Underhill, Blissett—F. D. Swin, R. H. Ryan, Chatham—J. F. Connors, J. F. Benson, Chatham (town)—Geo. Stohart, J. B. Bell, Derby—J. W. Vanderbeck, E. J. Parker, Gleneg—W. V. Ullock, J. W. McNaughton, Hartwick—D. Lewis, M. Bransfield, Ludlow—J. S. Pond, W. A. Campbell, Nelson—T. W. Flett, Jas. Harrigan, Newcastle, L. Davis, R. L. Malby, Newcastle (town) W. H. Belyea, North Esk—Edw. Menzies, M. Ryan, Rogersville—J. L. LeBlanc, P. Chaisson, South Esk—Geo. Hubbard, James Johnston, Col. Malby was chosen Warden for ensuing year.

J. L. Stewart secured appointment as sole reporter, and Messrs. Irving and Cassidy were chosen to wait on the Council as constables.

Councillors Stewart, Connors, Pond, Parker and Doyle were appointed a committee to select standing committees. They nominated the following committees:—

It was reported to Council by Registrar T. H. Whiston that index of the register of births and marriages had been lost and that the deaths had not been indexed for five years. Referred to County Clerk Com.

The council decided to eject Mr. Duke, the squatter on Shelrake Island.

Coun. Menzies presented the petition of Alex. McKay praying for reduction of taxation as he had been taxed in Newcastle and North Esk. Referred to Com.

Councillor Stohart presented the petition of Wm. J. Carruthers and fifty-eight other residents of the middle district of Newcastle parish asking for the repeal of the bye-laws to prevent cattle running at large between the Ravine and Old Bathurst Road. Referred to Com.

Coun. Menzies presented petition of residents of North Esk, asking that the bye-laws be amended to prevent cattle running at large between the Ravine and Old Bathurst Road. Referred to Com.

Ex-Coun. MacLachlan by permission, reported for the com. appointed to get estimates for new courthouse. He reported as follows: The new building was to be of stone, up to six feet above ground and from that of brick with stone trimmings. The first floor would contain court-house and rooms for Judges, barristers and sheriff, also for secretary treasurer with vaults. On the second floor would be the council chamber, committee rooms, etc., and on the third floor, rooms for the janitor, which could be occupied by the janitor of the jail and connect with the jail. The building would be only two stories high on the western side, and five high ceilings for the court room and council chamber, and three stories on the eastern side. The architect's estimates of the cost were \$42,250 with all vaults, light fixtures and furniture. The coun. valued the old jail lot at \$750, the registry lot at \$1000, and the wharf property at \$600—total \$7750. The committee recommended borrowing the money to pay for the building. It could be so arranged that annual burden therefore would be light. Report received. Adjourned till next day.

Council resumed Wednesday morning at 10.

The question came up of the Dominion Government officials' liability for county taxes, and was settled affirmatively.

The secretary was directed to notify the chief com. of Public Works of the names of road spots, as soon as possible after the close of coun.

Wednesday afternoon, Coun. Belyea reported from the Bye-Laws Com.

that Polling District No. 1, Blackville, include all the elections in Lockstead on a line with Jas. M. Smith's river line to the main South West river along the line to lower line of J. Sturgeon on the north side and Alex. Curtis on the south side of the said river, then running up river to John McDonald's upper line, then across the river to Thos. Curtis' upper line and across to Dennis Dooling's upper line and a line taking in all Bartholomew River and Broadbain settlement on a line running to Lockstead settlement the polling booth to be at or near Blackville public hall. District No. 2 to include all the electors residing on Renous River and Dunargon easterly to Parish line between Derby and Blackville, across Main river, along line between Nelson and Blackville, up river to Alex. Curtis' lower line, across river and along lower line of James Sturgeon. The polling booth to be at or near Indiantown hall. Report adopted.

Coun. Vanderbeck reported for the jail committee as follows:—

"We, the committee appointed to inspect the jail, find at present five prisoners, four of whom are in the best of health and well cared for. The fifth prisoner, and is not a fit subject to be confined in jail, he is a bad state of health and is unable to take care of himself, and we would ask the Council to look into this matter at once. The prisoner referred to is James Coughlan. We find the cells for prisoners clean, and in a sanitary condition, and the prisoners informed us that they are well treated. Report was adopted.

Council decided to employ a doctor to report on the prisoners' condition. The following resolution of Coun. Parker was adopted:—

"Whereas, in the opinion of this council a number of lunatics are wrongfully charged on the different parishes in this county and the government does not seem inclined to right what we consider a wrong

"Therefore, resolved, that the secretary write to the secretary of the Union of Municipalities of the province of New Brunswick to bring the matter to the attention of the said Union at its next annual meeting, and ask the said Union to take action in the matter, and if necessary to take steps to test the right of the government to make the parishes pay for lunatics so placed. Adjourned till Thursday morning.

### THEY CARRY MAILS FOR THE ICY NORTH

(Vancouver World.)

In a few days two young men will start from Vancouver to break the record for a 500 mile trip over ice and snow into the Peace River district.

These young men will carry His Majesty's mail to the far outpost of civilization established by the Company of Gentlemen Adventurers of England, trading into Hudson Bay, and incidentally into many other parts of the great fur producing sections. The couriers were Messrs. H. E. Bodine and Frank Watson, both experienced trail riders and trail followers. They are at present busy outfitting and it is a reflection on some people who have talked a great deal about bringing the northern trade to Vancouver that they have been forced to send to Seattle for sleds and other necessary parts of their equipment. They have secured two splendid dog teams and they figure on making the snow melt under their runners until in far Port Graham they will bring the second hearing to a close.

Justice Dowling has decided to limit each side to three expert witnesses and two of the defence trio were heard today as to the mental and physical examinations they made of Harry Thaw in the Tombs prison after his arrest for killing Stanford White.

Dr. C. G. Wagner of Binghamton, N. Y., and Dr. Britton D. Evans of Morris Plains, N. J., both superintendents of State Institutions for the insane were on the stand today. Detailing their conversations with Thaw in the Tombs they brought out more clearly two points which were glossed over last year. The first of these was that Thaw told them in 1906 he was a guest of Stanford White at a dinner party in the Madison Square Garden. He left early and was accused of breaking up the party. Some of the guests did not eat much. Thaw declared and the young woman who sat next to him declared that she had never seen him.

"Thaw also told the physicians about the first time he saw Evelyn Nesbit. It was in 1901 in front of a theater. 'A pure looking girl' he described her. If she had told her name was Nesbit and that she belonged to Stanford White. Thaw managed subsequently to meet the girl at an after-dinner party in company with several other stage persons.

### RUSHING WESTERN END.

G. T. P. Awarding Contracts For Pacific Sections.

Vancouver, Thursday.—Poley Bros., Larson & Stewart have been awarded the contract for the Grand Trunk Pacific for the construction of the section 120 miles west of Edmonton. A representative McArthur Bros., of Winnipeg, is now at the coast preparing a bid in competition with the above firm for the Pacific section.

It is learned that there has been a combination formed of local and interior physicians to obtain representation of the latter on the provincial medical council. The local doctors are said to have been very warm on many points, and after the meeting the reformers suggested a plan to divide the province into districts, giving three representatives on the council to the lower mainland, two to the island and two to the interior. The names mentioned for the latter are Dr. Rutherford, of Revelstoke, and Dr. Arthur of Nelson.

NEW YORK, Thursday.—When an early adjournment of the trial was taken today to enable the attorneys for the defence to prepare their long hypothetical question covering all the evidence in the case, there seemed no doubt that next week will bring the second hearing to a close.

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### P. H. A. CARON IS THE NEW MAYOR OF MOUNT JOLI

STE. FLAVIE, Thursday.—Mr. P. H. A. Caron has been elected mayor of the municipality of Mount Joli, County of Rimouski, P. Q. Mr. Caron is receiving the congratulations of his friends and acquaintances. There will be a grand masquerade on the ice ring on the 2nd day of February next in the evening.

Rev. M. F. Laurent, parish priest, has just finished the visits of his parish in Gaspé county.

A lot of immigrants are coming to work on the railroad. We hope the work on the road will be pushed to Pabos next fall.

PEKIN, Tuesday.—The recent edicts from the throne against agitation have not had a conclusive effect, but they have brought about a change for the better in the comment appearing in the newspapers.

Certain members of the government are doubtful of the outcome of the measures promulgated by the throne. They resent some of them, and they are not convinced of the sincerity of the government in extending the repressive measures to the provinces. There is even talk today, among some of the high officials, that in any other country would be considered as pre-empting a revolution.

China has at present eight important questions on her hands, aside from her negotiations with Great Britain and Japan. Four of these matters seriously threaten her sovereignty. According to some observers here, the Dowager Empress appears to be growing weaker, but this evidently is due to the fact that her contentions with the powers and her internal difficulties have come upon her at one and the same time, and that she has failed to make use of the abilities of Yuan Shi Kai, who complains that his hands are tied and powerless.

Indo-China has repeatedly sent warm messages to Pekin of the dangers attending the revolutionary movements on the Tonking border, where the course pursued by the rebels has provoked troops from Tonking, which is a French possession, to cross over into the Chinese province of Kwang Si. Against this the foreign board has protested, and the French minister here, M. Basset, has replied with adequate assurances.


Sir John Jordan, the British minister to China, is today sanguine of a satisfactory solution of the West River difficulty. This arises from the prevalence of piracy on this waterway, which Great Britain is now policing with a small fleet of gunboats. Sir John is particularly hospitable inasmuch as the province of Kwang-Tung has conceded a claim of 80,000 tons for piracy outrages.

A British gunboat, while searching for pirates on the West river, recently stopped and boarded a French boat. As soon as the nationality of the suspected vessels was made known she was released and proceeded on her way.

The course of action followed by Great Britain with regard to Manchuria, is expected to ultimately determine whether or not capital other than Japanese will be permitted to find investments in that territory.

The evacuation of the Chungki Valley in Thibet by British troops is being delayed, among other things by the necessity of settling the question of whether Thibet shall be included in the provisions of the Anglo-Chinese treaty concerning Thibetan trade. It is hoped that Thibet will be admitted to this agreement and that an understanding to this effect will shortly be signed.
