Maine Capitalists Owned the Property. Fully Insured.

BATHURST, N. B., Oct. 9 .-The large mills of the . Tracadie Lumber Co., together with the manager's residence, store and office, also a large quantity of lumber at Sheila, Tracadie, N. B, was totally destroyed by fire on Sunday afternoon. The property was insured, but the amount is

unknown. TRACADIE, Oct. 9.—The Tracadie Lumber Company's mills, hotel, sheds, and all the manufactured lumber, shingles, clapboards—every vestige of lumber, indeed-were burned Sunday afternoon. The fire caught in the boiler house and spread so rapidly in a northwest wind that nothing could be saved. Mr Wing is in | Bangor and Mr. Newcomb was in charge. The property was fully

This property was situated two or three miles from Tracadie village and belonged to Maine capitalists. The lumber mill was one of the finest in the province, being splendidly equipped with machinery so that all the lumber cut could be utilized for one purpose or another. There was also a box factory,

which was well equipped. Fire fighting facilities had been provided and the mill seemed to be in little danger from destruction from fire. The products of the mill have found a market in the United

States, and have been shipped by rail. The quantity of lumber on hand was very large. Mr. R. Wing, of Oldtown, Maine, is the capable manager of the mills, and it will be seen by despatches he was in Bangor when the fire occurred.
