Gordon Scott, the seven-year-old Niagara Falls boy who was hit by an auto on Monday night, passed away late last night at the General Hospital, Niagara Falls, without regaining consciousness. Coroner McGarry held an inquest at the Morse undertaker rooms where the body was taken.

The Wabash railway bridge over the Portage Road in Stamford Township was totally destroyed by fire Wednesday night. The fire is said to have been caused by sparks from burning grass. The bridge was a wooden structure and was valued at \$3,000.

The rate of exchange on Canadian money dropped in Niagara Falls, N.Y. yesterday from 13 per cent to 11 per cent. Two weeks ago the rate was 18 per cent. Bank officials said today that there would be fluctuations in the rate from now on, as the Falls banks had decided to follow the Toronto markets.

"The Canadian Otter," the largest vessel constructed at Welland by the British-American Shipbuilding Company, has been built in two sections, and the stern was launched yesterday successfully. The remainder, it is expected will be launched on Saturday. The vessel when completed will be 320 feet long, and will be taken to Montreal. The launching of a vessel in two sections has never before been attempted.

Maximum penalties will be asked for against the next list of persons failing to make their income tax returns, say officials of the City Assessment Department. The first group of those summoned were dealt with leniently, but others will not receive similar treatment. The maximum penalty is a fine of \$100 and \$10 for each day the return is overdue. Income tax bills numbering 47,000 have been sent out to date.

The funeral of the late Henry Trott Jordan Station, was held on Monday afternoon at 2:30 from his late residence, interment in Oak Lawn cemetery. The deceased who passed away on Friday, March 19th was 38 years of age. He contracted the flu about two weeks ago which terminated in pneumonia. He leaves to mourn his demise a sorrowing wife and one daughter, Ruth, at home who will deeply feel the loss of a devoted husband and loving father.

Swift Won Over. ALBANY, March 26.—An amendment made by Senator J. Samuel Fowler to his bill to repeal the daylight saving law has won for him the vote of Senator Parton Swift of Buffalo, the single additional "aye" needed to pass the measure in the upper house, Senator Fowler so announced. The amendment made by Senator Fowler simply gives cities and villages the right to pass local ordinances providing for daylight saving, despite the repeal of the state statute.

"I have amended my bill to meet the objections of certain city Republicans," said Senator Fowler. "The amendment will assure me of the single vote I needed to round out the required twenty six."

He added quite frankly that the vote won by this move was that of Senator Parton Swift of Erie. The daylight saving repeal bill was summarily defeated today in the Assembly by a vote of 70 to 64. Seventy-six are needed to pass a bill. Assemblyman Betts the introducer, moved to reconsider the vote by which the measure was lost.

Niagara Falls Folks Enjoyed Choir Concert

The Niagara Falls Review has the following:—

A concert of good sacred and classical music always meets with encouraging reception in Niagara Falls and that one given by the Welland Ave. church choir of St. Catharines in Lundy's Lane church last night emphasized the rule.

A great deal of the success of the production was due to the really fine work of Miss Anna M. Williams, organist and directress, who proved herself a most sympathetic accompanist, as well as a fine solo pianist.

The duet piano selection, "Shepherd Dance," and "Morris Dance," as played by Miss Williams and Mrs. Herr were delicately interpreted in a most pleasing way. Miss Williams' solo, the quartet from "Rigoletto," was also thoroughly enjoyed.

Lundy's Lane people were fortunate in having with them Mr. Ted Bramah a young violinist, one of St. Catharines most promising musicians, and as his accompanist, Mr. W. T. Thomson the former organist of St. George's Anglican church, St. Catharines, and one of the best known pianists in Ontario. Their selection "Ave Maria," was a strikingly beautiful number the violin being well handled with tones clear and fine. Mr. Thomson's accompaniment for this number was unusually fine, the two instruments producing a harmony in effect that could hardly be surpassed. Granados-Kreiser's "Spanish Dance" was also finely rendered the piano accompaniment being very brilliant, although played with perfect ease. Mr. Bramah responded with an encore for each number, his last being "Souvenir" by Drlia.

The choral part of the concert was mostly good, the bass and soprano sections showing the greatest strength. Mozzy's "Gloria" 12th Mass, 1stst none of its own beauty in the singing while the numbers "Rosate Haec," "Be Thou My Judge," "With Sheathed Sword," and "O Come Let Us Sing," were all well rendered and very much enjoyed.

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

CLASS 1 Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920: Trustees, executors, administrators, agents, and assignees must use Form T 3. Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4. Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.	CLASS 2 Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920: All individuals other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1. Farmers and ranchers must use Form T 1 A. Corporations and Joint Stock Companies must use Form T 2.
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Time Limit
All persons in Class 1, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 31st of March, 1920.
All persons in Class 2, as shown hereon, must file on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors of Taxation, or from Postmasters.
Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.
Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.
Make your returns promptly, and avoid penalties.

PENALTY

France is Willing Foe, But Will to Conditions Material Repa

PARIS, March 27.—Premier Briand, replying in the Chamber yesterday to the question of former Premier Barthelemy, said:—

"A crisis of alliances does not exist. There is only the nature and take of conversations."

With regard to the Russian Government the Premier declared:—

"The allies can only recognize the Russian Government when the Russian Government recognizes national autonomy in acts as well as in words."

The French Government would prefer to act like the United States, entering upon commercial relations with Russia on having relations with the Government the Premier said.

Turkey to Live On

Concerning Turkey, the Premier asserted that the allies would create a Turkey which can guarantee with the liberty of the organization, nor with the same economic organization.

Need of Public Called to A

The Board of Health at night passed a resolution that the city council to pass a by-law requiring the registration of all horses, cows, pigs, goats and sheep to be registered. The city require to be registered and a fee of 25c charged for each animal. This it was felt would help to prevent the spread of disease.
