

Samuel Fowler to his bill to repeal the daylight saving law has won for him the vote of Senator Parton Swift of Buffalo, the single additional "aye" needed to pass the measure in the upper house, Senator Fowler so announced. The amendment made by Senator Fowler simply gives cities and villages the right to pass local ordinances providing for daylight saving, despite the repeal of the state statute.

"I have amended my bill to meet the objections of certain city Repub-Gordon Scott, the seven-year-old licans," said Senator Fowler. "Ahe amendment will assure me of the single vote I needed to round out the required twenty six."

He added quite frankly that the vote won by this move was that of Senator Parton Swift of Erie. All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, pendants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

CLASS 1 Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920:

Trustees, executors, ad-

ministrators, agents and assignees must use Form Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or

other employees must use Form T 4. Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5. NOTE.—Individuals comprising part necship must file returns in their indivi-dual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.

PENALTY
