With 502 seats filled, neither the Coalition nor the Opposition have gained a numerical point. Out of this number of seats the Coalition obtained 277 and the Opposition 225 last January, on Saturday night they held the same number of seats. Of the 168 seats which have yet either to be filled or the results announced; last January the Coalition held 120, and the Opposition, 48. If last week's polling is a criterion, and it was very uniform day by day, these figures will not be departed from materially.

The relative strength of the groups

in the House will be much the same as it was before the dissolution. The numerical results of December may be much the same as those of January.

The answer of the electorate is far more decisive. The Irish vote could not be construed as favourable to the Budget. The Nationalists supported the Budget avowedly for expediency sake, although hostile to it. In the present election the keenest supporters of the Veto Bill are the National-


