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
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

The death occurred at Plymouth, C. B., of Henry Outfin, a former quarter master in the Navy and war vetaran, aged 92. He commenced a scafaring life in 1837, and three years later was present at the fall of Acre. After seeing African service he was wounded in the expedition up the River Plate South America. In 1854 he volunteered for the Crimea and fought in the trenches before Sebastopol. He was probably the last of the 24 survivors of the brig Heron, wrecked on a voy age to St. Helena, when over 100 were drowned. He was also shipwrecked off Bermuda in 1857.
