

**Egg War On in Philadelphia.**

Philadelphia, Dec. 13.—Eggs sold generally throughout this city to-day for 24 cents dozen, as a result of the crusade inaugurated on last Wednesday morning. In addition to the 7,000 cases containing 2,520,000 eggs sold under the direction of the Housekeepers League, retail dealers sold from their own stock at the same price. In some instances an even cheaper rate was charged, one dealer advertising "Suffragette eggs 23 cents a dozen," while many of the eggs sold by the dealers were of a good quality as those sold by the League, cases were reported of retailers selling inferior eggs for the double purpose, it is said, of discrediting the movement and getting rid of their worthless stock. The members of the Housekeepers League have disposed of 6,480,900 eggs, since the campaign to reduce the high price of living began here.

**Tells of Secret Society.**

Montreal, Dec. 12.—Claiming that a number of influential Italians in New York, Montreal and Vancouver are banded together in a society which was exploiting poor immigrants in this country and that this society was directly responsible for the death of the Italian Detective Petrosino, Carlo Battista, an Italian now under sentence of death here for the murder of a compatriot, Salvatore Macaruso, has made a long confession, which will be forwarded to the Minister of Justice, Hon. C. J. Doherty, at Ottawa. Battista, says this society of which he was a member, made a practice of collecting subscriptions on the pretence that the money was forwarded to the Royal Family in Italy. The money thus secured was distributed among its members. Petrosino discovered the scheme and to shut his mouth the society had him murdered. Battista gives the names of a number of people who, he says, are connected with the organization and an enquiry will likely be held to see whether the murderer's accusations can be substantiated. The local police are inclined to be of the opinion that Battista might have given out the names in a spirit of vengeance.

**Kidnapped Cashier Saves \$28,000 Bag.**

Hurls it Away When Bandits Put Sack Over Head and Whirl Him Off in Automobile.  
Chicago, Dec. 12.—A carefully plotted attempt to kidnap and rob M. J. Wright, of nearly \$30,000 was successful to-day in every detail except that of getting the money. Mr. Wright, who is cashier of a butter company, was walking to deposit \$28,027 in a bank when an apparently intoxicated man stumbled out of an alley and fell against him. He pushed the man away, upon which four others fell on him and pulled a sack over his head. A motor car dashed up to the curb and Mr. Wright was tossed into it. As the bag went over his head, however, he dropped behind a telegraph pole a satchel containing the money. A few minutes later, while Mr. Wright, with his head in the sack, was being whirled across the west side, Earl Halgren, while walking down the street where Mr. Wright was attacked, noticed the satchel. He picked it up and turned it over to the police. Mr. Wright telephoned to his office that he had been robbed. A message from the police that the satchel had been recovered was received about the same time.

**Poetry From Pulpit.**

Columbus, Ind., Dec. 10.—The Rev. P. L. Dimmitt, a Methodist preacher has created a sensation by a sermon directed against the mode of street dress now popular with women. A special portion of the sermon was the quotation from the pulpit of the following lines:  
"Little girl, you look so small,  
Don't you wear no clothes at all;  
Don't you wear chemise or shirt,  
Don't you wear a petti-skirt,  
Just your corset and your hose—  
Are these all your underclothes?"  
The poet closed with a prediction that—  
"After a while, I do believe,  
You will dress like Mother Eve."  
(The above was considered important enough to be sent over the wire in the press despatches.)

LONDON, To-Day.  
A naval engagement between the Greek and the Turkish fleets between the Dardanelles and Imbros Island, lasted an hour and a half. The damage done is problematic. The number of ships engaged is not known. After heavy cannonading the Turks who throughout remained under the protection of the forts, retired within the Dardanelles. The Turks claim to have silenced the guns of the armored cruiser, George Averoff, but the Greek account states only five men were wounded.
