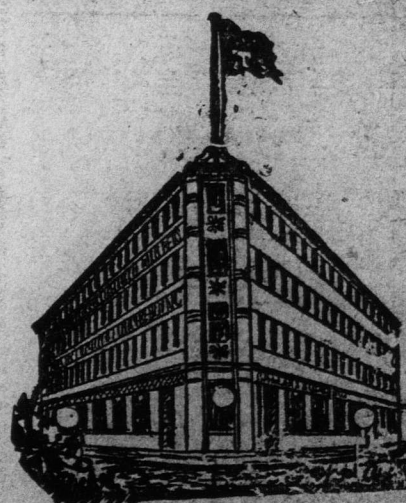

## Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

PORTSMOUTH, Nov. 7.—  
Orders were received to-day for 200 of 300 machines stationed at Portsmouth Navy Yard to prepare immediately for service in a southern climate.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 7.—  
Envoy Lind proceeded to the American Embassy, where he will reside during his stay. He had not notified anybody that he was coming. To all newspaper men, who spoke to him, he made non-committal replies.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—  
The presence of bubonic plague and yellow fever on the great trade routes from the South upon the Panama Canal, is giving grave concern to American health officers. Consul Baker reported to the State Department to-day that during the month of October there were 112 cases of plague.

BERLIN, Nov. 7.—  
The correspondent of the Gazette in Mexico City, telegraphs that he has the impression that Huerta will perhaps retire from the office of Provisional President, if the Great Powers support the action of the States, as by so doing he will avoid the appearance of yielding to American pressure alone.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—  
Postmaster General Samuel is inviting applications in tender for the construction of second and third high power wireless stations to form an imperial chain from contractors able to satisfy experts, by practical demonstration, of the efficiency of their system. The demonstrations will be required to indicate the capacity of the respective systems to carry on continuous and efficient communication, day and night, over a distance of 2,000 miles.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—  
The Cabinet met to-day for the first time in several weeks. All the secretaries, except Garrison, Wilson and the Attorney General, attended. It is understood that, at the instance of President Wilson, one or two members, who had planned to be out of the City, cancelled their engagements to attend. Latest news despatches, telling of Lind's return to Mexico City, were taken into the meeting, and Secretary Britan carried a large envelope of State department despatches.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 7.—  
Huerta's formal negative reply to the United States demands, which was discussed at last night's Cabinet meeting, will set forth the denial of any right, legal or otherwise, of the United States to demand Huerta's elimination, according to a statement coming from one of the departments of the Mexican government. The reply, it is said, also points out that

Huerta has no legal right to accede to the demands. The informant says that it was decided to incorporate in the reply a declaration that Huerta intends to increase the Mexican Army to 500,000 men.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—  
Decided efforts are being made to induce the British Government to come to an agreement with the suffragists, whereby a measure for the enfranchisement of women could be made a section of the official programme of the Liberal party, now in power. Some suffragist leaders admit that this movement has obtained considerable headway. A significant feature of the conference which have been held, is the presence of Mr. and Mrs. Pethick Lawrence, who have left the Women's Social and Political Union. It is known that the Government will consider "only a compromise based on an unqualified repudiation of the suffragettes and militant methods. Hitherto the constitutional suffragists have refused to criticize the actions of the militants, declaring it bad tactics in the face of the common enemy to question militancy, but several prominent leaders now express themselves as willing to abandon their former attitude as regards the fighting section. They have, they declare, become convinced that suppression of militancy is the only hope of securing parliamentary suffrage for women, which is the only form of political activity denied them in the British Isles where they possess municipal suffrage. Many hold every civic office outside of Parliament.

### Drags for Hull of Annie Roberts.

Government Steamer Makes Attempt to Locate Victim of Collision at Entrance of Harbor With Partial Success.

The Government steamer Lady Laurier, which came into port for shelter from Sunday's storm, made an attempt to locate the wreck of the ill-fated schooner Annie Roberts, that was sunk to the bottom by the Dominion Coal Company's steamer Wabana, two weeks ago. Mr. Vincent Mullins, the representative of the Marine Department at Sydney, very thoughtfully took advantage of the

presence of the Laurier being in port,

and ordered her to the scene of the recent tragedy, in the hope that some tidings of the unfortunate four Newfoundland seamen might be found. Capt. Travis, commander of the Government boat, at once weighed anchor, and for several hours grappled for the submerged craft. A very heavy undertow, however, prevailed, making it impossible for the searchers to accomplish anything further than the recovery of a spar of the Annie Roberts. Finding further efforts useless, owing to the weather, Capt. Travis returned to port, but before doing so he placed a buoy with forty-five fathoms of hawser attached, over the spot where the craft lies, and on the return of the Laurier which left yesterday for St. Paul's Island, Capt. Travis will make another effort to pull the wreck to the surface.—North Sydney Herald, Nov. 5.

### Oil Well Blaze in Roumania

Bucharest, Nov. 3.—A loss estimated at \$5,000,000 has been caused by fires which are spreading from one oil well to another in the petroleum district of Moreni.

The fires started yesterday with the explosion of a large well, and spread through the whole valley and along the hillsides, which were today a mass of flames.

Over twenty-five wells were alight all burning furiously. Fighting the fires has become very difficult, as most of the wells are in eruption.

## Proposed Addition to Holy Cross Schools.

There will be a meeting of the friends and supporters of Holy Cross Schools, in St. Patrick's Church, after last mass to-morrow, to make arrangements in connection with the proposed extension. The schools, which are now nearly twenty-five years erected, are altogether inadequate to meet the present needs, as the attendance is rapidly increasing from year to year, and several have to be denied admission for want of proper accommodation. Already a committee has been formed to deal with the question of extending the building, and the principal object of to-morrow's meeting will be to devise the best means of raising the necessary funds. Realizing the untiring efforts of the Christian Brothers in the cause of education in this city, we feel sure that the citizens of St. John's West, and especially the ex-pupils of the Holy Cross Schools, will come forward to-morrow in their numbers, and make feasible the financing of this necessary work.

We have received the following communication:—The Annex will contain three additional class rooms, one of which will be used as a Technical School. It is estimated that the cost of furniture and equipment for the new Schools will amount to \$1,000, and the Brothers have voluntarily undertaken to provide this equipment at their own expense. The great advantages of Technical Education are now within reach of the sons of the humblest men of the West End, and in this industrial age, the value of such training can hardly be overestimated. Rev. Bro. Kennedy has the assurance of the Superior of the Order in Ireland, that when the Schools are completed, at least one if not two additional Brothers will be added to the staff. To appreciate, even to some little extent, what this addition to the staff here means, it may be stated that some four or five years ago, a wealthy lady of San Francisco erected a most costly school building to be conducted by the Christian Brothers, but owing to the many demands on their resources they have been unable to undertake the work up to the present time. Let us then show the good Brothers our appreciation of the noble work they are doing for us in the great cause of Education, by a record attendance at the meeting to-morrow.—Com.

### New Motor Fuel.

The Petrol Substitutes Joint Committee, appointed to find an efficient substitute for dear petrol, has discovered a process which it is claimed, will produce 40,000,000 gallons of British motor spirit annually without in any way depleting the country's mineral resources. It is expected that this process will revolutionize the motor-spirit industry and render Great Britain partly independent of foreign supplies.

The importance of such a discovery can hardly be overestimated, as the chief trouble of the motor industry to-day is the exorbitant price charged for petrol—at present.

The Joint Committee have tested a substitute which involves the utilization of a by-product of coal hitherto unsuitable for motor fuel.

The spirit will be sold to the consumer at not more than 1s. 2d. a gallon, probably less, and will be equal to the best quality petrol.

### Nurse Dies Following Scalding of Back.

Toronto, November 3.—A despatch from Boston announces the death of Miss Agnes Horgan, Superintendent of the Philip Neri Hostel, this city, in the Boston City Hospital.

Miss Morgan went to Boston two weeks ago with a party of friends to attend the Catholic Missionary Conference, and was scalded in her bath on the night of her arrival.

The best medical care and attention were given her, but the scalding was so severe that death resulted yesterday afternoon.

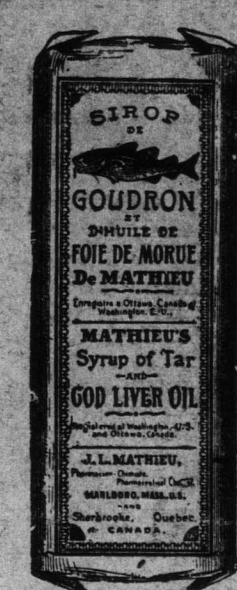

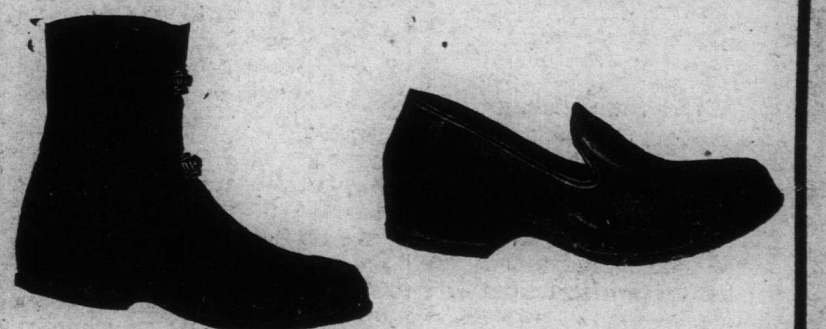
