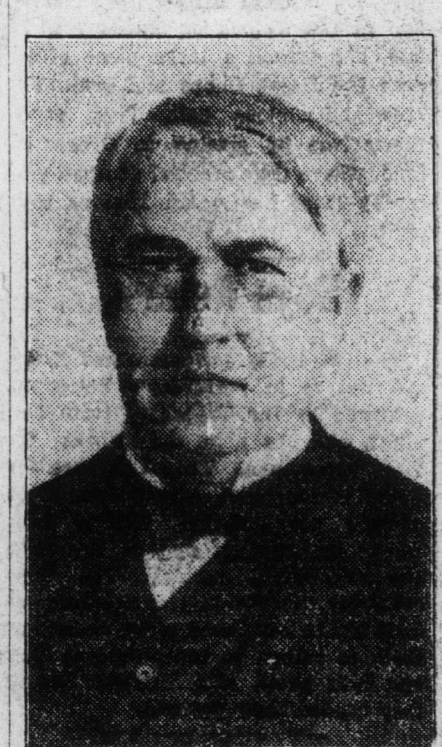

There is no accommodation whatever left, every cot being occupied, whilst not less than thirty persons are in boarding houses in the city awaiting admission. The cause of the congestion is that a great many people suffering from slight ailments come from the outports without regular certificates. To overcome the difficulty a system is now in vogue whereby urgent cases, which are diagnosed as such by the physicians of a place, are given the preference in reaching the city and will be properly looked after while those who have minor troubles and come on their own hook will have to pay their own expenses.

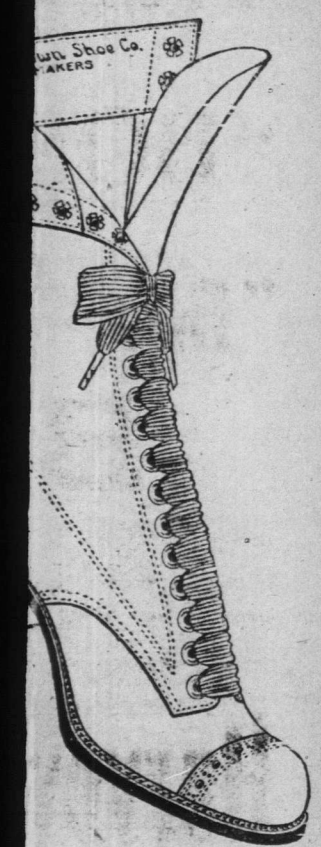
