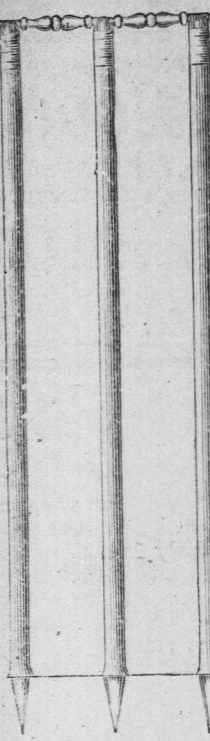

A Reply to "East Anglican" Regarding Schools.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—In the issue of your paper on the 27th inst., I notice a letter signed "East Anglican," regarding the "teachers work" and the "Educational system."

In scanning over the lines, I noticed some points of which I feel it my duty to make comment.

(1) "E. A." refers to the schools as a mere cramming place, and I would like to say that the system at present in vogue, is not at all perfect, but it is as good as the Educational authorities can at present propose, and if "E. A." knows of a better system, I cannot see why he refrains from making a proposition.

(2) He says that, according to what he has read in some of your issues, that the home lessons are helping the teachers out. I would like to have that explained. If a teacher in one of the public schools has to deal with from 50 to 90 scholars from the A B C to the Intermediate Grade, I would like to ask "E. A." to give his honest opinion and say if he thinks that a teacher has a moment to spare, even if he has nothing to do by day, but correct home lessons and give explanation on lessons for the coming night.

(3) Mr. "E. A." wants to know if it is true "that the children with educated parents get through their lessons better than the children with uneducated ones." I would like to say, Mr. Editor that the reverse occurs just as often, and I would almost venture to say, that the child of the uneducated parent, is the better of the two.

I think, Sir, a little illustration will prove that. The teacher gives a class an explanation on a certain lesson in school. He has not time to test them on that lesson in school, but he gives the class the lesson to do in the night. In the morning all the scholars have the lesson done. When that lesson is corrected he finds that the educated parent's child has the lesson done better than the uneducated parent's child, but when they receive a test on that lesson in school, he finds that the uneducated parent's child can do it better than the other. This shows that the work was done for the educated parent's child home, while the other did it himself.

(4) He also says: "That he doesn't intend to pay the teacher and do the work himself." I wonder, Mr. Editor, does "E. A." think that the teachers of this Colony want him or anybody else to do their work. I do not believe they do, and I do believe, Sir, that the teachers have a strenuous work to perform which the majority of them are doing creditably. And as to paying the teachers, I would like to say this, I expect if they were getting as much salary as "E. A." they would do their work better, because to tell the truth, I cannot see what is keeping so many of them in the profession.

Says War is Surely Coming.

New York, May 27.—The Herald's London special cable says:
Mr. Robert Bacon, Secretary of State in Mr. Roosevelt's Cabinet, left for home aboard the Philadelphia yesterday.

"War between the United States and Germany is coming as surely as night follows day," said Mr. Bacon. "Germany is calculating on the feeling in the United States cooling off and now tells us she will get around to the Lusitania case in a week or so, which is another crowning insult to the nation."

"Will American feeling for massacre of its citizens cool off? I think not. Will those in the Government who believe peace more priceless than honor try to make the American people forget? Of this, unfortunately, I have not the same confidence."

PROGRESS AT THE WAREHOUSE.

Warehouse work, which was opened early in August, is looked after by a committee of ladies under the chairmanship of Lady Sloggett. Up to March 1, the Warehouse Committee had been so well supplied with garments, etc., by their numerous kind friends that everything sent out up to that date was a gift, nothing having been purchased till within the last two months. Some of the largest contributions have been received from overseas, among them being consignments from Newfoundland, Boston, various counties in New Zealand, as well as from India and Australia. Many of the socks sent from Newfoundland are made by an old lady of eighty-two, who works at the rate of eight pairs in three weeks. Then the Malta centre of the St. John Ambulance Association has sent very large supplies of cigarettes, each cigarette having the badge of the Order stamped on it. They are sent in cases, also inscribed with the same badge, thus making a most attractive gift.

HALF OF SHIP'S CREW DOWN WITH BERT-BERT.

New York, May 27.—The British steamer Dewa, laden with sugar from Cienfuegos, Cuba, came into port last night with 28 of her crew of 40 men suffering from bert-bert. Since leaving Cienfuegos seven of her crew died from the disease and were buried at sea.

Most of the work about the ship had to be done by the officers, and engineers were compelled to go into the stokehole and help feed the boilers.

The Dewa was taken in charge by Health Officer O'Connell, who will remove the sufferers to Hoffman Island to-morrow for observation, and fumigate the ship.

Prelates Call On the Nation.

London, May 28.—The Archbishops of Canterbury and York have issued the following joint pastoral letter which is to be read in all churches June 6:—

"After ten months of war we see more clearly than at first the greatness and severity of the ordeal which is putting the spirit of our nation to the test. The spirit arrayed against us threatens the very foundation of civilized order in Christendom. It wields an immense and ruthless power. It can only be decisively rolled back if we, for our part, concentrate the whole strength of body, mind and soul which our Nation and our Empire holds. We solemnly call on all members of the Church and urge upon all fellow citizens to meet with glad and unstinted response whatever demands of service or sacrifice the Government decide to make. The great war, righteously waged, calls out that spirit of willingness with a plainness and intensity which nothing can rival. On behalf of righteousness and in our country's cause we have nothing too dear or too sacred to be offered. God has so taught us. Let us obey by what we give and by what we are. May His will be done."

Canada Has Sent 26,000

OFFICERS AND MEN TO ENGLAND SINCE THE OUTBREAK OF WAR.

OTTAWA, May 28.—A memorandum issued by the Militia Department states that up to the present time nearly 56,000 officers and men have been despatched overseas by the Canadian Government. It is anticipated that by the first of July, the number will reach approximately 70,000. More than 500 nurses have also gone forward. The recruiting, enlistment, and organization of additional forces is steadily proceeding, and is the more necessary by reason of the very heavy casualties which have been sustained by the Canadian division during the past five weeks in the fighting near Langemarck and its vicinity. "The gallantry, resourcefulness and tenacity of the Canadian troops during those battles," says the memorandum, "have never been surpassed."

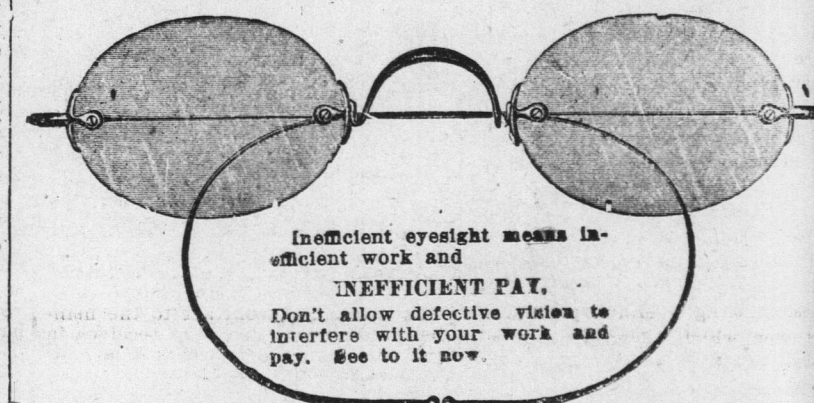

RAID CROWN PRINCE'S HEAD

PARIS, To-day
Official. Twenty-nine French planes between four and five in the morning bombarded the headquarters of the Imperial Crown Prince. It dropped 178 shells, many of which reached the mark and several the darts. All the machines were subjected to a severe cannonade, they all returned unscathed.

NORWEGIAN TORPEDOED.

LONDON, To-day
The Norwegian steamship Coda was torpedoed and sunk yesterday. Flannan Islands. The crew landed the Hebrides group of islands off West Coast of Scotland.

LAPLANDER SAILED.

NEW YORK, To-day
The Red Star Line steamship, land, sailing as a White Star steamer left here to-day for Liverpool with passengers, 14,000 tons of cargo. One passenger was an American seenger.

WITHOUT RE-ELECTION.

LONDON, To-day
The Commons passed in all stages the bill enabling the new peers to sit during the period of without re-election. The Lords rejected the first reading of same bill. It will take up its further stages tomorrow. Lawrence Ginnell, Irish nationalist, who follows leadership of no Parliamentary parties but is a leader and only member of his party was not to be denied however, and despite the censorship of the speaker succeeded in saying members of the House who formerly were calling each other liars and politicians were now aspiring to be each other jobs and were afraid to face the electors. Ginnell was attacking Premier Asquith's political character when the Speaker ordered him to resume his seat. After the passage of the Suspensory Bill, the Commons passed the first reading of a bill establishing a Ministry of Munitions over which Lloyd George preside. While it is expected that the Government will have support of the whole Commons and Lords with the exception of a few irreconcilables such as Ginnell, there is to be an official opposition in both Houses. Leadership of that in the new House has been assumed by the Hon. Henry Chaplin, Unionist, and the courtesy extended to Privy Councillors Chaplin took his seat on the front bench on the left of the Speaker where he had as companions new and old Privy Councillors all known supporters of the coalition. Behind him, however, was a little group of radicals who will accept nothing but a Liberal Government and who as a result of their disapproval of the coalition crossed the floor of the House and took seats from which they faced Ministers and where they will hold a better position to cross examine the Government. The proceedings of the Lords were confined to a first reading of a bill relieving the new ministers from appealing for re-election, and a few remarks by the Marquis of Lansdowne, and the Earl of
