The fact is that all along this front the Russians have resumed counter-attacks from the fortress Novo Georgievsk, but these, according to German accounts, failed in their purpose. Before Rozan, another Riv-er fortress, the Germans declare they have stormed and taken two fortified villages and captured a number of prisoners. 
