#### TO STAY THE HAND OF TIME.

Since time immemorial the female world has waged tireless warfare against wrinkles. They are the falling sign of approaching age and you desire to stay the hand of time from making these countless lines on your face. You must constantly feed and care for the tissues so that they will possess their healthy firmness.

Every woman knows that the skin when in a healthy condition is pliable, transparent and smooth. To keep it in this condition it must be well lubricated and kept thoroughly clean. As soon as the skin is allowed to become dry it will wrinkle like parchment and it is sometimes next to impossible to eradicate the hairlike lines.

The tissue beneath the skin must be well nourished, for if they lose their firmness and shrink the upper layer of skin will wrinkle. One should particularly be careful of the skin in the spring time, for the wind and strong light have a tendency to dry and wrinkle it.

Be extravagant in the use of almond milk for it is one of the oldest and simplest cosmetics in use. It is invaluable, for it not only softens the skin but refines it as well. Always before applying any lotion to the face, the skin must be thoroughly cleansed and for this purpose there is nothing like a good scrubbing with a complexion brush, rubbing the brush over a week, and using warm water and liquid green soap. As some sort of application is essential to enable the brush to move over the skin easily, you will find the following mixture will answer the purpose: Iodine, 10 cc.; salicylic acid, 1/2 dram; glycerine, 1 ounce; distilled water, 1/2 pint. This is cleansing and serves as a soap substitute.

After brushing the face for three or four minutes, rinse with warm water and finally with cold.

## Education in the 2nd Battalion

### ROYAL Nfld. REGIMENT.

Education in this Battalion was first undertaken in August 1918, when I found certain N.C.O.'s promoted for good service in the field, unwilling to retain their ranks through lack of education required for their duties in a Home Battalion. Mr. Matthews volunteered to start classes for these men, in their spare time, with the result that, in a wonderfully short time, many of them improved their education to such an extent as to qualify themselves for the rank of Sergeant. Later the classes were extended to include Privates desirous of promotion to N.C.O.'s who, though sufficiently educated for their military duties, wished to continue their studies which had been interrupted by the War. All these classes were necessarily held after parade hours, and the exigencies of military training prevented any assistance being given to Mr. Matthews in the way of assistant teachers. In October a class for returned E. F. men was started, during afternoon parade hours, and in the evening classes extended to admit of the inclusion of any men of the recruit companies who, desired to attend, a couple of ex-school teachers offering their services as assistants to Mr. Matthews. This opportunity was eagerly embraced by many men, some 200 attending the various classes at the beginning of November. The signing of the armistice rendered possible the holding of the classes during parade hours, and also released some N.C.O.'s to assist in the instruction. It was found possible to considerably enlarge the scope of the instructional scheme, and classes were organized in:

### BOLSHEVİK ATROCITIES.

OMSK, April 15. Indisputable evidence of a massacre by the Bolsheviki of upwards of two thousand civilians near Omsk, was obtained by American Red Cross officials returned from that district. The evidence discloses almost unthinkable atrocities.

### ANARCHY IN MUNICH.

LONDON, April 15. Complete anarchy reigns in Munich according to the Exchange Telegraph Company, all work has ceased and no trains are running. Houses are being looted and banks threatened.

### TRADE FOR CANADA.

LONDON, April 15. (Via Reuter's Agency, Ottawa.) Reuter's learns, in connection with Canadian trade developments in Europe, that a Greek commercial mission is leaving Athens, at an early date for Canada, to ascertain the extent to which Canadian industries can supply Greek requirements, and to arrange preliminaries for placing Greek orders in Canada. Reuters also learns that a Roumanian steamship has left Liverpool for Montreal, to load goods supplied by Canada to Roumania, under the recently signed agreement. Mr. Lloyd Harris, chairman of the Canadian trade mission leaves for Paris Wednesday, where he intends to investigate Belgian requirements with a view to ascertaining what Canada would be able to supply, and thus help in the work of restoration. Canada will be represented at a large exhibition of British manufacturers which is to be held at Athens this autumn.

### SEND OFF FOR CANADIANS.

LONDON, April 15. The first brigade of the first Canadian division, six thousand strong, embarked at Southampton, homeward bound, aboard the Olympic, under command of Brig. Genl. G. E. McKinnon. They were accorded an enthusiastic send off by the townspeople. The quayside was densely thronged with spectators. The Mayor and members of the corporation attended, and a hand played military airs. These witnesses the departure of the vessel included Divisional General Macdonald. Many of the men, sailing to-day, practically fought through the whole war. The Mayor of South-

The Educational Training is proceeding satisfactorily and the Staff at my disposal is sufficient to deal with all the men of the Battalion.

There are many difficulties in the way of Vocational Training—almost entirely due to lack of technical appliances. Such part of instruction as is theoretical can be carried out without difficulty, but it has been found very hard to arrange for practical instruction for more than a very few men in each trade. I am in close touch with the Imperial Education Committee and supply a representative at their meetings, beyond arranging for a couple of instructional tours little has been done so far that our men can participate in.

The Canadian Educational Authorities invited men of this Contingent to attend some of their classes but these again were only theoretical and the subjects too advanced for their meagre attainments. The Local Educational Authorities have started classes—2 hours weekly—in Motor and Electrical Engineering which some of our men attend. In the meantime I am using such facilities as exist in this Camp for instruction of the men, while anxious to improve their education, propose returning to their pre-war jobs and do not wish for technical instruction, so that there will be few, if any, of those who have applied for special courses who will not have obtained them.
