For services rendered in connection with the Korean atrocities, the Governor-General of Korea honored Dr. Martin by presenting him with a gold medal, on behalf of the Government. On the eve of his recent departure from Korea, Dr. Martin was made the recipient of four highly complimentary addresses, one from the government officials, another from the business men, a third from the young men, and a fourth from the Church with which he was connected.

COMING BY S.S. DIGBY.

Among the passengers on S.S. Digby due Monday morning, is the Rev. J. B. Thompson, B.D., of Tintah, Minnesota. Mr. Thompson is returning to his native land on a short visit after an absence of twenty-five years. For fourteen years he labored as a missionary of the American Board in Tintah, China, and on the death of his wife, which occurred some years ago, he returned with his children to America, where he assumed the pastorate of a Congregational Church. Many will remember the addresses given by Mr. and Mrs. Thompson during their furlough in St. John's a quarter of a century ago. He is accompanied by his two daughters, one of whom was born here, while the other claims China as her birthplace. During their stay in the city, they will be the guests of his sister, Mrs. A. A. Parsons, Forest Road.

Bell will have to face a full marathon distance of 26 miles which will be something new to him, though in view of his strong finishes at 10 miles his supporters as well as he himself feel that he can do the full distance. His record for the 5 mile is 23.12 and for the 10 mile 56.43—only 9 seconds slower for twice the distance. He is in good form having been in strict training all the winter and spring. Although almost an imperative necessity it is regretted that it is not possible to have a manager sent with him, but we understand that Mr. Dobbey has undertaken to see that Newfoundland's representative is well looked after on the other side.

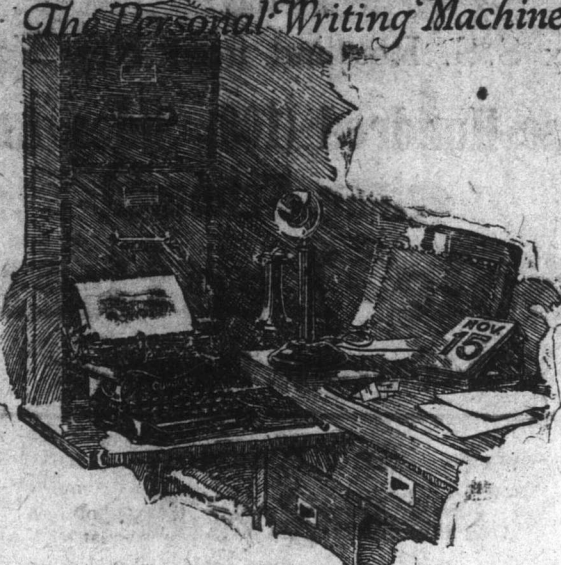
