### Revision of the Tariff

It is well known that a number of business men have been engaged for the past year in the arduous duty of taking evidence on a proposed Revision of the Tariff. So far nobody knows what they have recommended or what changes they propose to have made in the schedule of duties. The fact that the Government shirked the opening of the House at the regular time has delayed the publication of the report as well as any information as to what changes, if any, the Government intends to make. This uncertainty has had a killing effect on the importation of goods this spring, and outside the essential food supplies, the merchants are in a quandary as to what to do. The merchants on Water Street, as one of them remarked to us yesterday: "Don't know where they are," and, therefore, are importing the smallest possible quantities so that they may not be caught with heavy stocks should a reduction in duty be made on the goods they have imported. This state of affairs will continue until the Government lets the public know what they intend to do in regard to the recommendations and suggestions made by the gentlemen who comprise the Tariff Commission. It is particularly incumbent before the fishery begins that the fishermen should know and get the advantage of any contemplated changes in the articles of supply used by them in the fishery. Every possible item of help is needed just now to make the fishery look like a paying proposition; but if this information is withheld till the end of June, which appears likely, the changes in favour of the fishermen will do no good this season in the way of getting a reduction on their fishery accounts. We would suggest to the Government if they intend to make any reductions in the tariff on fishermen's outfits, to let them know at once. So much has been done by Minute of Council, surely this can be done also. If the fishermen knew there was to be a reduction on their outfits, it may induce them to prosecute the fishery instead of pulling up their stakes and leaving the country.

### Labrador Fishery.

Next to the Shore fishery this is the second industry in rank of importance to the people of Newfoundland. Its neglect cannot be compensated for by the Humber Deal or any other land industry that will employ at the most four to five thousand men. The Labrador fishery last year employed 27,000 men. Most of these men will, if they can obtain the means, engage in the same occupation the coming summer, and as the problem of carrying on the industry has now become acute, it is the obvious duty of the Government to render all assistance possible, to enable the fishermen to continue this time-honored occupation with a reasonable expectation of making it pay. Taxation on outfits should be reduced at once, and instead of legislation restricting

shipments and making minimum prices for foreign buyers, there should be legalised regulations to secure as far as possible a perfect cure of Labrador fish before being shipped on board vessels for market, both on the Labrador and in Newfoundland. A few years ago the fishery was the paramount subject with the then Minister of Marine and Fisheries, Hon. W. F. Coaker. To-day he seems to have lost all interest in it and announces that "the Humber Proposition has been the ambition and the desire of his life." He should know that a dozen Humber would be required to compensate for the abandonment of the codfishery. Let the Humber work go on and let those who elect to work in the woods go there to make a living if they find they can do so. The number, however, will be limited to 5,000 at the most for the next ten years. The other forty or fifty thousand will want to stick to the fishery. They should receive encouragement from the State to enable them to carry on an industry which means so much to the whole country. And what applies to the Labrador fishery is equally applicable to the Shore fishery. If the fishermen say that the industry did not pay last year, they have greater reason to fear that after squaring their accounts in the fall, that it will not pay this year. The first step in the direction of making it pay is to reduce taxation on outfits, the second is to allow none but sufficiently dried and cured fish to be sent to the markets as prime quality.

### An Outrageous Proposal

It is rumored to-day that Capt. Bonia is fighting to hold permanently the office of Finance Minister. Strange things we know have been done by this government in violation of precedent, common decency, and the constitution, but this, should it be permitted by His Excellency will be the greatest outrage of all. The proposal is to appoint Mr. Bonia and hold the portfolio of Finance Minister in the Upper House. It is truly a terrible state of affairs in a country supposed to have responsible government. Will the public stand for it? What influence is being brought into play to attempt such an outrage? Bonia was defeated, he "failed to deliver the goods" and has no claim, right, or qualification for the office. The Minister of Finance should be a member of the House of Assembly. In fact, Mr. Coaker expressed himself strongly on the contention that in future no "make-shift" should be given a portfolio in future who had not a seat in the House. The visit to Catalina may be concerned with this question. It is interesting now to watch and see if Mr. Coaker will have back bone enough to resist such an outrageous proposal? The fact that it is attempted naturally gives voice to the question. Who is the man behind the gun?

Last year's Ball was declared the season's greatest success and judging from the interest taken in to-night's event, this season's will eclipse all others.

He was told by the Prime Minister that as he had spent so much money in the West End and after all this, failed to win a seat, the best he could do for him was to put him back in the Legislative Council. The Doctor in high dudgeon: I will see your chief about it and tied him off to Port Union, taking Mr. Cloutier as interpreter and Mr. Fitzgibbon as recorder. ## Non-Stop Flight to Stag Bay Gold Fields.

Ice Conditions on Labrador Coast Worst in the Memories of Oldest Inhabitants—Return Flight was Race against Time.

The aeroplanes of the Aerial Survey Co. (Nfld.) Ltd., have returned to Botwood and further details are available of the now famous flight to the Stag Bay Goldfields.  
A non-stop flight was made by Major Cotton from Hawkes Bay, Newfoundland, to Rigole, Labrador, and the Martinsyde made a landing five miles outside with only four gallons of gasoline in her tanks. A further supply was brought out by dog teams as the ice was badly broken in places. The conditions on Labrador Coast are the worst experienced in the memories of the oldest inhabitants. At Cartwright the houses are completely covered by a level field of snow with only the chimneys showing. The schoolmaster at Cartwright was trapped in his house for two days and a man walking overhead on snow shoes heard him tapping the iron chimney to attract attention.  
The Coast is tightly packed with ice for more than sixty miles out to sea which is as far as the eye can see from the aeroplane, and it will probably be the middle of June before any coast operations can be thought of. All the big rivers are opening up and are bringing down

### Schr. Spencer Lake Driven Ashore.

VESSEL HAS RUDDER DAMAGED.  
Deputy Minister of Customs, H. W. LeMessurier, C.M.G., received a message yesterday evening from the Sub-Collector at Wood's Island, stating that the schooner Spencer Lake, with a full cargo of Scotch cured herring, was driven ashore yesterday morning by the ice, near the Bay of Islands Fisheries wharf. The vessel had her rudder broken but was otherwise undamaged. The Spencer Lake is owned by Lake and Lake, Fortuine. She is one of the fleet of herring vessels that got frozen in the ice during the winter. It is understood that repairs to the damaged rudder will be effected at Wood's Island after which the vessel will sail for market.

### Stonemasons Wanted.

A message received from Bermuda requests that a draft of 30 stonemasons for work on one of the big hotels now under construction there, be despatched at once. The men are guaranteed four months work, and will be paid at the rate of 75 cents per hour, besides their upkeep. Their passages will be paid both ways. As there is very little work in the city for masons, it is thought that there will be no difficulty in securing the desired number of men. Messrs. Harvey and Company are looking after all arrangements, and it is probable that the draft will go forward by the S.S. Sable I., sailing for Halifax on Monday next. The last draft of men who left here by S.S. Sylvia, two weeks ago, arrived safely at their destination yesterday.

### Kyle Bound to North Sydney.

WITH 400 PASSENGERS ON BOARD.  
S.S. Kyle, Capt. Cross, left Port aux Basques for North Sydney at 4.10 p.m. yesterday, taking 400 passengers, mostly second class, en route to States, where they are going to seek a livelihood. The greater number of the passengers are men with wives and families from points along the West Coast, who are compelled to leave their native land. The Humber Deal, it appears, holds out no inducements to them to remain.

### War Veterans' Graves.

#### MONUMENTS BEING ERECTED.

The work of erecting the headstones for war veterans interred in the local cemeteries is being carried out with despatch under the supervision of Lt.-Col. (Rev.) Nangle, C.F. The monuments are placed as follows: Five at the General Protestant Cemetery, two at the Salvation Army ground, three at Belvidere, five in the Anglican Cemetery and four at Mount Carmel. The headstones for the outport cemeteries are being forwarded to the different localities and the work of erection given in charge of the clergyman of the place. The headstones, which are similar in workmanship and design to those erected over all the British heroes, are of very neat design. They are made of Hopton wood, a handsome stone mined only in Derbyshire. In size they are about 3 feet high by 18 or 20 inches wide. They are inscribed with the number, rank, name and date of the deceased, the regimental badge, or an anchor in the case of naval men, and also the inscription desired by the relative. In all the cemeteries, excepting Belvidere, the sleeping heroes are placed in a single plot which is surrounded by a neat concrete wall. At Belvidere the bodies were interred in family plots and they are also marked by private headstones.

### Salmon Plentiful.

#### STORAGE COMPANY WILL AGAIN PURCHASE.

Fresh salmon was fairly plentiful in the local market this morning and sold at from 12 to 15 cents per lb. according to size. The Newfoundland Atlantic Fisheries Co., (Cold Storage) have not started purchasing as yet. It is understood that they will buy on the same extensive scale as last year in the outports later in the season. The Company will also purchase codfish locally as heretofore. All the salmon put up during 1922 have been disposed of profitably according to officials of the Company. Within the past two weeks a large quantity of salmon lying over from 1921 storage has been sold to farmers for use as manure.

### Work on the Humber.

It is understood that Major B. Butler who so ably performed the duties as head of the Employment Bureau has been given charge of selecting men from the unemployed of the city for the Humber. It is understood that arrangements are now being made to send a number of men from here within the course of the next few days. Work for men too old to go to the Humber will also be provided at the rock sheds. Nothing definite as to the rate of pay or other conditions have as yet been announced, but the government's policy is understood to be "If you want to work and can't go to the Humber well go to Jerrie."

### TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

#### COMMUNIST MEMBER SUSPENDED IN COMMONS.

LONDON, May 16.  
John T. W. Newbold, Communist member, was suspended in the Commons last night, the vote suspending him being 300 to 28. Newbold had spoken disrespectfully of the Chairman of the Committee, Captain Edward Alberton Fitzroy, Conservative. Captain Fitzroy called upon Newbold to withdraw and this led to sharp recriminations between Laborites and the Chairman. The Laborites reproached the chair for not allowing Newbold to apologise. Fitzroy persisted in his demand for the withdrawal, and called upon the Sergeant-at-Arms to remove Newbold, who declined to move from his seat. Thereupon the chairman sent for the speaker who upheld his action. This provoked fresh acrimony and the speaker assembly thought Capt. Fitzroy acted hastily, but said he could only abide by the rules of the House. He suggested that Newbold could make a communication to the House to-morrow and that he believed the House would take a considerable and generous view of the situation. Finally, amid protests by the Opposition the speaker put a motion for suspension which was carried amid great excitement. Newbold then withdrew.

#### U.S. FINANCIER DEAD.

MENTONE, France, May 16.  
George Jay Gould, United States financier, who has been ill from the effects of a pneumonia attack at his villa on Cap Martin since March 20th, died at 2 o'clock this morning. He died peacefully with his wife and children at his bedside.

#### ENGLISH RAILROAD MEN AT MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, May 16.  
Colonel N. H. Balfour, former assistant to Sir Henry Thornton in his management of the Great Eastern Railway in England, and A. J. Thomas, son of the Englishman, mentioned and also former associate of Sir Henry, have both arrived in Montreal to assist in the management of the Canadian National Railway.

### Chiropractors' Bill is Passed in Legislature.

EDMONTON, April 13.—Without amendment and without division the legislature Wednesday night reported favorably for final ratification of the government's new bill establishing special regulations for the practice of chiropractic in the province.  
This measure sets up an advisory board of five members, two of whom shall be duly recognized resident chiropractors of the province, two members of the medical faculty of the University of Alberta to be nominated by the president of the university, and a chairman to be named by the minister of health under whose direction and supervision the new act is placed.  
Fee is \$50.  
Fifty dollars will be the registration fee, with \$10 for renewal every year. Applicants entering the province will be required to pay these same fees; pass educational examinations fixed by the university, the standard not to be lower than grade eleven; have a diploma from a school of chiropractic recognized by the board, with a residence course of not less than three years of six months each and a minimum of 2,400 hours of study, of which he has attended at least 90 per cent. and to be of good moral character. Examinations will also be required in anatomy, physiology, histology, chemistry, sanitary science and hygiene, bacteriology and the principles and practice of chiropractic treatment, one of the outstanding restrictive clauses says.

#### Can't Administer Drugs.

No registered chiropractor shall prescribe or administer drugs or medicinal preparations or treat any venereal disease, or any communicable disease, as defined by the Public Health Act, nor shall he perform any surgical operations or practice osteopathy. The act provides that a duly registered practitioner may call himself "doctor of chiropractic."
