WEEKLY MEETING.
The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon.

Mayor Martin presided and Councillors Outesbridge, Vincombe, Ryan and Dowden were present.

The usual preliminaries, the following matters were given consideration:

The Deputy Min. of Finance acknowledged receipt of the Council's cheque for \$60,921.73, being payment on City Debt, and the yearly contribution towards the upkeep of the Department.

Communications were read from the General Hutchinsons in the matter of complaint by the Pope Manufacturing Co., St. John's, for force-feeding by State Carrels adjoining their premises.

No objection from a new leasehold to the building being held for this purpose, and that the performance on the part of the purchaser involves a question of private law for which there is a legal case.

With regard to the application of Bulger, Hayward Avenue, for permission to convert stable into forgo, the building is reduced to two-thirds of its present height. It was stated, as the Inspector General and the Engineer have no objections, that the permit be issued.

Inspector Carter in reporting on the sanitary condition of houses, Queen's St., stated that it was within the power of the Medical Officer of Health to order owners to repair or demolish the building in sanitary condition, if they fail to comply with the order of the Health Officer. The Council proceedings to have the houses repaired. The Department of Health is to be communicated along these lines.

Reference to the claim made by M. Parsons, Freshwater Road, for permission for poultry destroyed by the Solicitor advised no responsibility on the part of the Council.

The petition of the residents of School Road re erection of lights in this locality was referred to the Street Committee.

Communication was read from Edwin A. Crowther, seeking certain information re assessment of public buildings, reasons for certain buildings being exempted, and the financial basis on which the City Clerk is to be pleased to enlighten gentlemen and give any information they may desire.

Consistent of P. F. Fahy re condition of surface drain, Bonelody St., referred to City Engineer.

The Lighting Committee advised a plan of 14 new lights in various parts of the City which are at present in need of same.

The City Clerk reported that arrangements had been completed with Bradshaw agent for Clapp's vacant lot for the taking over of, recent Water St. East, which will in time be known as the "East End Cab Stand." The Engineer will immediately place several men to work on the property so that it may be ready for the opening day.

Notice the meeting of the City Engineer's report, it was decided that the Water Main be extended to the Water Place and that a new anti-siphon hydrant be erected in this very congested locality. (2) The Engineer advised the replacing of the old storm sewer at Madgeville Street, with new 36 inch pipe. This sewer was laid by the Department of Public Works 17 years ago, and of late has become very unsatisfactory owing to its being choked at the bend, junction of Madgeville and Water Streets.
