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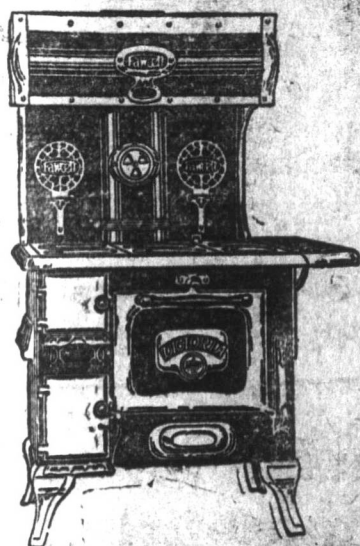
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Virtuous Liars

The picture at the Star Theatre on to-day has the novel title of "Virtuous Liars," and in many respects lives up to the novelty of the name. It is a Whitman Bennett production adapted from E. C. Hollands' original story and has an exceptionally strong cast, including such popular players as David Powell, Edith Allen, Maurice Costello, Burr McIntosh, Naomi Childers, Dagmar Godowsky and Ralph Kellard.

The interest is well sustained, commencing early in the story when a rather sporty husband returns to his wife after an all-night party with the usual lies about business. His wife, however, sickens of these tales and after accusing him of being deceitful tells him she has had enough. He takes her at her word and departs, leaving her to bring up their small daughter through her ability as an artist.

We next see the young woman after she has won a prize and has gained a wealthy art patron, a role splendidly portrayed by Maurice Costello. Burr McIntosh interprets the role of a friend of the art patron and makes a lasting impression through his sterling acting. Naomi Childers portrays his niece and shows all of her old time vivacity and life. She is a typical society girl and naturally fails to make a hit with Dr. Norman Wright, portrayed by David Powell.

Some interesting sequences are taken of a public clinic of which Dr. Wright is supervisor. There are also interesting bits of action in South America where the young husband finds new attractions in a young Spanish girl portrayed by Dagmar Godowsky. These scenes are exceptionally well done and show all the warmth and temperamental characteristics of the Latin race.

The climax furnishes a bit of dramatic action that holds the audience in suspense until the final fade-out. The production is one which will please most audiences because of its great variety of settings, its unique treatment and strong cast.
