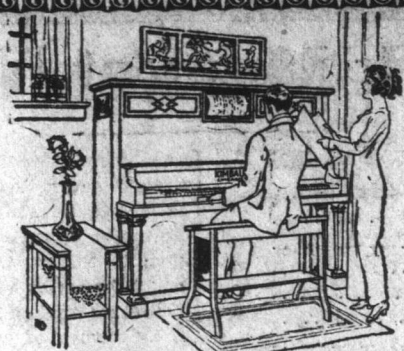

A REQUEST TO MOTORISTS

FOR KIND CONSIDERATION.

It has been brought to the attention of the Newfoundland Motor Association that there are several thousand people in the city who do not own motor cars and who walk to Bowring Park on Sunday and holiday afternoons.

It is a well-known fact that these citizens are deluged with dust in the fine weather and often splattered with mud in wet weather, as however careful a driver may be, it is usually impossible not to raise dust and sometimes it is impossible to prevent splashing when driving through the mud.

The Association has therefore decided to issue a personal request to Motorists generally not to use the Southside Road on Sunday, Holiday and Half Holiday afternoons, thereby affording the many people in the city who do not own cars an opportunity to walk to the Park in some degree of comfort on Sundays and holidays. (This request, of course, does not apply to motorists living on the Southside nor motorists wishing to call at houses on the Southside on these afternoons). This is an appeal to Motorists, not an order nor a demand. A little consideration is all that is asked and the Association believes that Motorists, generally, are considerate.

Romance and Richelieu
Comes to Life on Screen

IN WONDERFUL FILM AT THE NICKEL MONDAY.

The colorful days of Cardinal Richelieu, when romance and intrigue were the dominant factors, will live again when the elaborate photoplay, "Under the Red Robe," begins its engagement at the Nickel theatre on Monday.

In many respects the premiere of the new film will be one of the big events of the current theatrical season. "Under the Red Robe" has all the essentials for the sort of picture which the public wants. Taken from Stanley Weyman's famous masterpiece of the same name, it reflects not only a wonderful medieval romance, but all the pomp and ceremony, the plotting and intrigue of Cardinal Richelieu. Mr. Thomas is the heroic lover, Gue de Berault, and Miss Rubens plays Renee. Others in an especially notable company are Genevieve Hamper, Wm. H. Powell, Rose Coghlan, Ian MacLaren, Mary McLaren, Otto Kruger, Evelyn Gonnell, Gustav von Seyffertitz, Sydney Faust, Arthur Housman and Andrew Dillon.

How Should We Really Live It?

Millions must have said: "If we could only know about how long we are going to live," but if it were told them that they could know, what then? How many do you think would avail themselves of the privilege? And how much happiness would they get out of it if they did?

Household Notes.

Fill chilled halves of cantaloupes with sliced fish poaches and garnish with maraschino cherries.

The more tender squashes can be peeled, sliced, dipped in batter and fried, an eggplant is done.

Serve toasted graham bread with orange or grapefruit marmalade, and cocoa for Sunday supper.

Plain rice custard can be flavored with chocolate or coffee and served with sweetened whipped cream.

Maple syrup, confectioner's sugar and cream, mixed to the proper consistency, make a delicious fudge.

If you wish to serve the breast, neck, or shank of a lamb, it is best to have it rolled, and then roast it.

Sprinkle sliced oranges and onions with chopped olives, garnish with cream and serve with French dressing.

Chopped celery is nice stewed with one-half as much rice and twice as much water. Season, and serve hot.

A cupful of currant jelly beaten with half a cupful of melted butter makes a delicious spread for hot biscuits.

Sweet potatoes are delicious baked

in milk in casserole. Sprinkle generously with sugar and bits of butter.

Perhaps you might rent your sewing machine occasionally to people who wish a few hours' use of one at a time.

Scrubbing with soapy water will clean the steel-topped gas range. Use a cloth moistened with a little oil to rub dry.

Candied fruits and chopped nuts make a nice garnish for pineapple salad. Serve with Russian cream dressing.
