

WASHINGTON SENATORS WORLD'S BASEBALL CHAMPIONS.

Defeated Giants 4 To 3 In Final Game. WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Washington won the World's Baseball Championship to-day, defeating the New York Giants, four times National League Champions, 4 to 3, in the twelfth inning of the seventh and deciding game, one of the most spectacular ever played. McNulty, the young outfielder, drove in "Muddy" Rale with the winning run with a double to left field in the twelfth after one was out. The credit for the final victory went to Walter Johnson, the great veteran, who went in as relief pitcher with the score tied in the ninth innings and held the Giants scoreless for the rest of the game. The wildest and most frenzied demonstration that ever followed a world's series victory came with the winning run. Most of the vast crowd of 35,000, which included President Coolidge, swept down field in a loyal outburst over the climax to Washington's first pennant victory, her first world title, and around the dugout where the Senators' team were wild with delight over one of the greatest achievements of baseball; the crowds warmed and went wild, throwing hats, cushions and spirits to the winds in their frenzy.

TEX RICKARD LOST MONEY ON FIRPO-WELLS BOUT.

TRENTON, N.J.—Tex Rickard lost \$5,005 in promoting the Willis-Firpo fight in Jersey City, according to a statement filed with State Controller Newton A. K. Bugbee, who is also State Athletic Commissioner. Actual expenditure as set forth by Mr. Rickard in connection with the bout, was \$467,855 and the total income was \$462,850. Firpo received \$156,211 as his share of the receipts and Willis \$150,000. The Federal Tax was \$46.

285 and the State Tax an equal amount. Juan Homs, Mr. Rickard's representative in the Argentine received \$4,871 for salary and expenses. The health of the fighters was insured at a cost of \$5,000 while \$3,712 was paid for fire insurance. Mr. Rickard expended \$42,431 for repairs to the arena at Boyle's Thirty Acres.

WALTER JOHNSON FAILS TO STOP GIANTS.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—Walter Johnson, the old master, buckled on his armour to-day in a final fight for the glory of the world's series, the victory he has sought for eighteen years, but fate, with the mighty bats of his foe, turned him back. Unleashing a furious, ruthless attack, the New York Giants battered the great veteran to defeat for the second straight time, captured the fifth game of the series from the Senators by a score of 6 to 2, and left to-night for Washington with the 1924 world's championship within their reach. The Giants, coming back to-day with the powerful type of attack that carried the Senators to triumph yesterday, now hold a formidable lead of 3 to 2 in games.

DEMPSEY-GIBBONS BOUT THIS FALL.

And Jack Renault May Get Chance At The Heavy Champions. New York.—Speculation on the question of whether Jack Dempsey will await the coming of next spring before again defending his world's heavyweight, or will accept an indoor bout against one of the less dangerous of his challengers, was revived the other day when the title holder without any previous announcement of his plans, started light training at Stillman's Gymnasium, on Eighth Avenue and Fifty-Third Street. Dempsey went through the equivalent of 12 rounds, occupying himself with shadow boxing, working the pulleys, punching the inflated bag and hanging the heavy stuffed bag.

All told Dempsey was in the gymnasium for perhaps 40 minutes in a mid-day workout. When the title holder concluded his drill he stepped on the scales which showed his weight at 199 pounds. He looked in excellent condition and seemed to delight in the return to gymnasium work.

While the resumption of training would indicate that Dempsey is keeping himself in fighting shape for an indoor battle, it was impossible to get definite information as to whether this really was the motive, which indicated the champion's departure from the career of vacationist, he has followed since his arrival here.

Jack Kearns, the champion's manager, would not admit that he planned a winter bout for Dempsey. He made the significant assertion that "something is liable to pop up and I want the champ to be ready if he is called on."

Jack Renault, Canadian heavyweight, and Tom Gibbons, St. Paul veteran, who enjoys the distinction of having survived 15 rounds with Dempsey in the memorable battle at Shelby, are the candidates whose names have been mentioned prominently in discussion of the champion's plans since Dempsey's arrival here.

Efforts to obtain definite information as to whether Dempsey would defend his title indoors against Renault or Gibbons, however, have invariably met with response that the champion will not defend his title again until next year, when he plans two matches, one of which will prepare the title-holder for a proposed battle against Harry Wills. Intentions point, however, to a bout between Dempsey and Gibbons if the champion boxes this winter.

Discussing the champion's plans, Manager Kearns refused to be pinned down to any definite statement.

"I know the champion was scheduled to work out to-day or attend a golf match," said Kearns. "His purpose in starting light training is to keep himself fit for a fight if one should develop. I don't know yet whether the champ will undertake some theatrical work or do some fighting during the winter. But it's certain he'll be occupied with something."

"Dempsey will be ready to defend his title in an indoor bout if suitable inducements are offered. Right now I have not received an offer which appeals to me. But something may come

along which would make it worth while for the champ to go into heavy training. Gibbons might make a suitable indoor opponent for Dempsey. Renault is another who could face the champ in an indoor bout. Each man is clamoring for a crack at the title, and if the right inducements are offered I will accept either match for Dempsey. Otherwise the champ will remain idle, so far as the ring is concerned, until next spring or summer."

Eddie Kane, manager of Gibbons, has paid several visits to this city recently for conferences with Promoter Rickard in the Garden. Ostensibly these meetings have had to do with a proposed bout between Gibbons and Gene Tunney, American light-heavyweight champion, or a match between Gibbons and Renault or some other suitable heavyweight. However, it has been suspected that in reality a bout between Dempsey and Gibbons is in the making, and that those identified with the project are awaiting a proper moment for public announcement of the plans.
