The oldest name for Christmas is 'The Feast of Lights." This has no turnt in churches and houses as part of the Christmas rejoicings. The name is in remembrance of the lighted heavens in which the angels appear-

ed on the first Christmas Day. Another Christmas name is "The Feast-or Festival-of the Incarnation." This holds the reminder that the coming of the Babe of Bethlehen meant the God was incarnate-in

flesh-on the world. Another name for Christmas was

The word "Christmas" is, of course, a contraction of "Christ's Mass." in the same way that Michaelmas and Martinmas are contractions of "Michael's Mass," and "Martin's

"Mass" meant "service," in the church sense, thus "Christ's Mass Day" meant that on December 25, a special service would be held in re-

membrance of His birth. Old carols prove that our forefathers did not, as we do, cut the Christmas into "Chris-mas." They pronounced it as "Christ-mas." and thus retained its real significance. "Yule" is a very old name for hristmas, and there are a score or nore explanations as to its origin and meaning. The one generally accepted is that "Yule" is a Christianised ver-sion of "Juul," which was a December pagan feast.

Emile Parent, K.C., acted on behalf of the family of the missing pilot. Cecil Thompson represented Captain Butcher and A. R. Halden appeared for the Canada Steamship Lines.

The testimony of First Officer Jas. F. Scott, who joined the ship in Montreal three weeks ago, brought out that the voyage to Quebec, was not without incident. He said that half the crew came aboard drunk and that the ship's carpenter ran amuck with an axe soon after they left Montreal.

Icy Decks.

Second Officer Thomas Hunter, who was on the bridge with Lachance when the Airedale grounded, produced the log-book which showed the course taken just previous to the grounding. He also said that there were no openings in the bridge or deck rails, but added that the deck was covered with ice and that it was raining.

Captain Butcher said that the last time he had seen Pilot Lachance was thirty minutes after the accident.
