Pollard's at the Lyric

An immense audience took advantage of the Pollard's engagement at Sherman's Lyric theatre last evening, and the applause testified to such enthusiasm as has rarely been manifested by a Calgary audience.

Curtain calls were numerous and the little artists were generous with their bows. "The Gaiety Girl" was the light and tuneful opera in which they sang and danced.

Teddie McNamara, as usual, was the centre of attraction. That was comedian appeared in a grotesque Scotch costume as Corporal Lane. Little Daphne Pollard appeared to better advantage in her role of Lady Virginia Forest, a society lady, than in any of the roles she has so effectively portrayed during the engagement.

Fairly like Ivy Pollard, aged five years, did a dancing turn that for grace and intricacy would have been becoming and intricate five times her age. Eva Moore, the sweet soprano, duplicated her usual hit as Rose Brierly, the captain's daughter. Little Lily Bull, as the jealous wife of Lord Gray, was just as cunning as could be and May Martin in a minor role was conspicuous for the delicacy of her work. Irene Findlay and Leah Leitch were seen again in masculine parts and again demonstrated the grace and ease with which a girl can make believe she is a boy—when the boy to be impersonated is a thorough little gentleman.

Oscar Holm, as Lord Gray, judge of the divorce court, gave a fine portrayal, and Jack Pollard as Rev. Brierly, reminded the audience of the first class comedians of the grown-up histrionic world. Jack Pollard's height is deceptive. He towers above the other children on the stage, but is an average sized 14 year old when considered in "citizen's clothes."

Roy Smith, who has an excellent voice, sang the Tommy Atkins song with rare effect. The chorus accompanying him did especially good work. Fred Pollard, whose voice is in the first organization, was with Teddy McNamara, kept upon the stage much longer than is usually permitted by the management. The very insistent and delightful Marie Pollard, as the French maid, made a petite and Parisian. Little May Fraser, as Lady Adith Alwin, was dainty and pretty as she could be. The play for this evening will be "A Runaway Girl."

GOLDEN WEDDING OF OLD TIMER

Prince Albert Man Married in Kildonan Half a Century Ago

Prince Albert, Jan. 1—Fifty years ago on the last day of 1856, James Stewart, master of the Hudson's Bay post at Fort Garry, was married to the daughter of a fellow servant, and today Mr. and Mrs. Stewart are still well and hearty, and are celebrating their golden wedding here.

Old timers throughout the west remember both Mr. and Mrs. Stewart, they are Scotch right through, Mr. Stewart having been born in the Orkneys 80 years ago, while his bride, a native of Canada, was the daughter of a Hudson Bay servant hailing from Scotland and an original Selkirk settler.

Mr. Stewart first served the company at York Factory from '51 to '55, but was a resident of Fort Garry and Winnipeg from '55 to '98 when he came to Prince Albert.

The wedding took place in the historic old Presbyterian Church at Kildonan, Rev. Dr. Black, the first Presbyterian missionary in the West, performing the ceremony.

There were two groomsmen, Sandy Munroe and George Bannerman, the latter still living at Willoughby, Sask., and two bridesmaids, the bride's sister Elizabeth, and Mary Bruce, who also remains as Mrs. Cook of Clandyboye, Man.

Mr. Stewart was one of those imprisoned by Bell in the winter of '69 and '70, and his wife cooked the daily meal for the prisoners during the two months. Many friends of the aged couple called to extend congratulations today and congratulatory telegrams were received from George H. Ham, of the C.P.R. and others this evening.

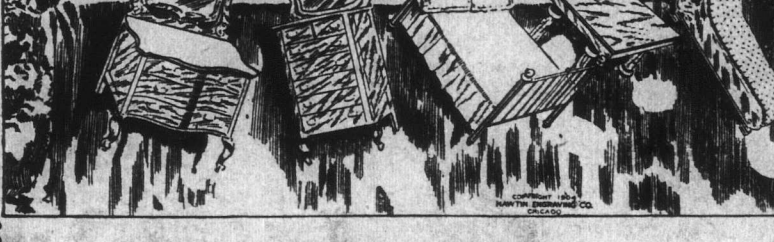
