Toronto, June 12.—The two days' game between the Australians and All-Torontos was won by the Constablers by 242 runs this afternoon. Without a desire to disparage the efforts of the locals, it can be said that the visitors could have won by a good many more. Good sportsmen that they are, however, they decided to give the crowd a run for their money and the homeaters a chance to redeem their poor showing with the bat in the first innings. They have, at least, the dual satisfaction of making the best score yet registered against the Antipodeans on the present trip and also dismissing them for the smallest number of runs—146.

The batting of the All-Torontos was in striking contrast to that which characterized their venture on Wednesday. Admitted that the Constablers did not unmake their heaviest batteries until the innings were well on, yet none of those who performed with the ball can be classified as second raters.

POLOISTS ALL READY FOR GAME ON SATURDAY

All Members of International Teams Feeling Fine; Light Practice Held

New York, June 12.—Both the English and American polo teams had light practices today, the English playing on the field of John S. Phipps at Westbury, and the Americans confining themselves to the third field at Meadowbrook. The Americans made no effort at combination or team play but devoted an hour to goal shooting and exercising their ponies. Stoddard, who will be No. 1, with Larry Waterbury at No. 2, played with much more confidence than on Tuesday, and it is believed he will be a formidable opponent to Captain Chespe on Saturday.

The English team lined up with Captain Chespe, No. 1, Captain P. M. Peak, No. 2, Lord Wodehouse, No. 3, and Henry C. Phipps back. They were opposed by a mixed team, who cut in and out and were composed of John S. Phipps, Rene La Montagne, Reid D. Straight, Captain Thomas, Captain Lockett, Carleton Burke, W. M. Lowe, Thomas Le Bouffier, and Howard S. Phipps. The game was won by the English by a score of 6 to 5, and was fairly good.

In the fourth period of the game La Montagne's pony fell and rolled over his rider, who, however, was uninjured and continued in the game. The two international teams will rest tomorrow for the final effort on Saturday.

Both the British and the American ponies are in fine condition. The field is in excellent shape.

A High School Lad Breaks a World's Record

TACOMA, June 12.—Smashing a world's record, whether in an intercollegiate or interscholastic competition, is something worthy of more than passing mention. Today Alfred Crane, high jumper, basketball and football player, registered at the stadium high school, is one of the most talked of athletes in America. This is because of his wonderful achievement in the high jump in the Washington state interscholastic track and field meet Saturday. Crane cut the world's mark by one-quarter of an inch, clearing the bar at 6 feet 2 3/4 inches.

The previous record was made by J. S. Spraker, who at the Princeton interscholastic meet, held in 1899, went up 6 feet 2 1/2 inches. This record made by Spraker stood for 14 years until Saturday, when Crane cleared the bar by a quarter of an inch. The Tacoma boy may well feel proud of his jump. Tacoma, too, may well feel proud of the new world's interscholastic champion.

FOREST FIRES THREATEN VANCOUVER SUBURBS

Vancouver, June 12.—Today Provincial fire wardens called out all the available fire guards for the purpose of preventing a serious conflagration in the districts of Shaughnessy Heights and Point Grey. The danger is the burning of huge pyramids of forest debris, some of them rising to a height of eighty and a hundred feet. Permits for the burning of these have been cancelled. The warden states that nothing could save these localities if once started, and that the result would be the wiping out of the residential portion of the city.

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TRAINS CRASH; FIVE ARE KILLED AND MANY INJURED

Second Section of Springfield Express Ran Through Signals

Stamford, Conn., June 12.—Five persons are dead and many injured, some seriously, as the result of a record collision on the main line of the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, opposite the local passenger depot at 4:45 o'clock this afternoon, when the second section of the Springfield express, westbound, crashed into the first section which was just leaving the station.

The dead are:

Mrs. Edward J. Kelly, wife of land agent of C.P.R., instantly killed.

Frank K. Gantfield, Springfield, Mass., instantly killed.

Dr. Harmon G. Howe, Hartford, Conn., instantly killed.

Everett H. Woodruff, Flushing, L.I., instantly killed.

Unidentified woman.

"The seriously injured."

P. J. Jennings, New York, lacerations about head, probably fatally.

S. W. Patterson, Red Bank, N.J., cut about the head and body, critically injured.

George Walton, New York, connected with C.P.R., arm broken and badly cut about head and arms.

Allen A. Warfield, Washington, D.C., leg broken and injured in groin.

S. S. Benson, New York, injured in back, condition serious.

P. J. Garrity, Hackensack, N.J., badly cut about head, back and legs, may die.

J. J. Martin, New York, head and face badly cut.

Mrs. Roberta Mayerson, New York, badly injured, nose torn off and face badly lacerated.

The engine of the second section ploughed through Pullman car "Sky Lark." In this car there were 21 passengers and practically all of these were injured more or less.

According to an official statement given out by the railroad, the indications are that the engineer of the second section ran by both the distant and home signals.

The Springfield express was the same train that was in wreck at Westport, Conn., last October, in which eight persons were killed and scores injured. This wreck was also caused when the engineer ran by signals.
