PARIS, Feb. 11.—A sensation has been caused in financial circles here by the disappearance of a well-known banker, who is known to have left debts to the amount of 20,000,000 franes, and who may have committed suicide. The banker is Victor Mace. He had a private bank in the Rue Cadet. Mace opened the bank five years ago and began business by offering to pay high interest for deposits, this interest in many cases averaging 10 per cent. monthly, or 120 per cent. a year.
