serve but for Mr. Tracy. The engineer ex-
pressed thanks for the kind utterances. If
he stayed it would be because his re-
lations here would be more pleasant

The Late Thomas Paterson, Sen.

On Sabbath, March 29, Thomas Paterson,
sen., died at his residence, North
Dorchester, after a brief illness, aged 86.
He was born in Banffshire, Scotland, and
was married in 1826 to Ann Cruickshank,
Rothamby, who died Dec. 28, 1842.

1844 he was again married to Jane Mc-
Gregor, parish of Keith, Scotland. He
came to Canada in 1853. On Dec. 28, 1877,
his second wife died. The issue from the
first marriage were William, Banffshire,
Scotland; John, West Williams; James and
Robert, West Nisour; Thomas and
George, North Dorchester, Alexandria.

Lockwood; Ann Stewart, Blyth; Isabella
Hogg, Thamesford; and from second mar-
riage only one survives, Jane Hogg, East
Nisour. The annual gatherings to the
old home for several years have presented
representatives from the cradle to the
tomb, including 88 children and grand-
children and twenty great grandchildren.

In politics deceased was a life-long Re-
former; in religion, a strict Presbyterian,
having officiated as elder in Thamesford
Presbyterian church for over 30 years. He
was a man of deep religious convictions, a
strict observer of the Sabbath, a devoted
and faithful elder, father and brother. The
pastor, elders and members of the church
bear ample testimony of his worthiness.

While strength remained he organized and
superintended a Sabbath school in the school
houses, first session of Dorchester, which
was largely attended by all denominations.
A spiritual awakening among the young of
this place caused him great joy. He often
referred in declining years to his humble
efforts for the spiritual welfare of these
children as the happiest moments of his life.

About 90 vehicles assembled at the old
homestead on April 1, at the break up of
our Canadian winter, when roads could not
be worse, to perform the last solemn rights,
and the pastor, Rev. Mr. Cameron, im-
proved the occasion by solemnly address-
ing the friends from Psalms, xii, 1: "Help,
Lord, for the Godly man ceaseth; for the
faithful fall from among the children of
men." He earnestly pleaded that as God
in his providence was removing his tried
and trusted servants, men should step into
the breach with lives newly consecrated to
his service, and especially he pleaded that
prayer on behalf of the congregation of
Thamesford, "Help, Lord," so that men
with equal zeal and love for the master's
work would be raised up to assist him to
minister to the spiritual wants of that con-
gregation. In conclusion, he said: "I have
known deceased for twenty years, during
seventeen of which I have been his pastor
and co-worker. I never knew a truer or
more faithful man; and just to show his
character I will give you one example. He
thought he could not possibly survive over
the Sabbath and called the members of the
family to his bedside and charged them not
to procure a coffin or do anything that
could be left undone until the close of the
Lord's day, but to remain quiet and rever-
ence the Sabbath." Paraphrases 42 and
53 were sung at his own request. The six
sons of the deceased acted as pall-bearers,
the remains being interred in Dickie's
Cemetery, Nisour, after an earnest prayer
by Mr. Cameron. "Dust to dust, ashes to
ashes," he was laid to rest in the full hope
of a bright and glorious resurrection.
