

Bereaiter Women Can Practice Law in Virginia.

NEW YORK, June 18 .- A Times special from Richmond, Va., says: Mrs. Belva Lockwood has won a signal victory in Virginia for women. For the past tour years a struggle has been going on in this State to induce the Legislature to pass a special act permitting women to practice law, but without success. After a long fight Mrs. Lockwood's counsel secured a decision from the Supreme Court of Appeals, which allows her to practice the legal profession in this State. This, of course, throws open the same profession to all of her sex who can pass the examination.

A few weeks ago the Court of Appeals, by a vote of 2 to 2, one member being absent, decided against Mrs. Lockwood's petition. Upon a re-hearing the court, sitting at Wytheville, revoked its former decision and decided in favor of Mrs. Lockwood.
